NEW YORK—There is one more shoe factory running in Poland, 250 jobless, destitute shoemakers are back on the payroll after several years forced idleness and 10,000 barefoot children are soon to have shoes. That's one way Isidor Hershfield, American Jewish Relief Commissioner in Poland is combining relief and reconstruction work. He found the factory in Vilna, subsidized it with relief funds at his disposal, gave employment to 250 hungry Jewish workmen, and immediately began turning out children's shoes.

The present cold freezing weather is injuring the fall grain quite badly. It is still too soon to tell how much damage was done to berry vines and other small fruits by the cold in December, but they look very sickly, only where the vines were covered with snow. The roads are very bad and are daily getting worse, and before spring comes they will be almost impassable in many places.

FOOD SHORTAGE TO BE ACUTE

Shortage in Production Not Likely to be Made up Next Year

LONDON.—The shortage in production of food caused by the war has not yet been made good, and is not likely to be in the next year, says Charles O. McCurdy, parliamentary secretary to the Food Ministry. The wheat crops in exporting countries had run down while the demand for wheat in the importing countries was up, he declared. That was largely due to the fact that crops in Central Europe were greatly diminished. He predicted that the next year would be the most critical since the commencement of the war with regard to supplies and prices of both butter and cheese. The dairy product of Australia would be much below the normal owing to drought. There was no prospect of the world's supplies of sugar being increased, he said. As regards meat there was a surplus in the country at the present time but it should not be inferred from this that there would be no difficulty as regards the meat situation in the coming year. In Europe, owing to the ravages of war, the meat products would be down by about 3,000,000 tons. It was evident, he said, that the people of Europe would not be able to eat as much meat as they had in the year before the war. Mr. McCurdy understood that the requisitions from France, Belgium and Italy at present amounted to between 400,000 and 500,000 tons. He did not see where they were going to get it but it was vident that if people of this country got as much meat as they needed they would not have it because the rest of Europe was hungry and to a large extent would be starving. At the present time, however, there was a glut of meat in England and during the next two or three months it would be arriving at a rate at which it would be difficult to dispose of it. There was a serious risk of a large proportion of these cargoes going bad owing to inadequate cold storage facilities.

Crabtree Chronicles
CRABTREE, Ore., Jan. 20.—The potato growers who did not sell before the freeze, and did not get their stock of spuds frozen were in luck for once, as the price now being offered is the highest on record in the office of the "Crabtree spud growers association." W. L. Gearhart and W. E. Watson loaded a car of spuds last week and are now considering the advisability of using part of the proceeds to buy up the Lacomb oil fields. J. N. Reiley is beginning work on the basements of his new house, which he had to discontinue on account of the cold spell. The rock crusher at Sanderson's bridge is being run at full capacity now in order to keep the flock of trucks going, which are hauling gravel on the Albany road. From the job they are doing it looks as though the road would be ready for surface by next summer. Harmony Grange had an open meeting Saturday for the installing of officers and entertained many visitors at banquet which only Grangers know how to prepare, and in addition to the Lecturer's program which in itself was a rare treat, there were some splendid talks on co-operation and consolidation of schools, which is becoming a real live issue in these parts. Those who spoke on the consolidation question were, Worthy Master, F. D. Cornett, Leslie Cade, of Grand Prairie Grange, Cap. F. M. Powell, and Mrs. Powell and others. Brother Cade was the installing officer of the day and was assisted by Mrs. Cade. W. M. Powell announced a community meeting to be held at Union hall at Crabtree on February 14, for further discussion of the school question and other matters of importance to the community. There will be a dinner and a good program prepared for the occasion. Capt. Powell and family were guests at the Cornett home on Sunday. Will Volkman is about ready to serve the public at his new garage in Crabtree, which he is fitting up in the Bungalow store building. M. A. Freeman is getting the addition to his store in shape to be ready for a grand opening for the spring trade. There are quite a number of gasoline woodsaws which are kept quite busy supplying the present demands for wood, but the present supply and demand makes it look like the next winters supply will be very short.
