Japanese May Withdraw Army From Siberia

Wife of Evangelist to address Ladies Friday; Meetings Successful

Mrs. Charles A. Bowen, wife of Dr. Charles A. Bowen, the evangelist at the Methodist Church, will address a meeting for women and girls, at the church Friday afternoon at half past two.

Mrs. Bowen spent eight years as a missionary in China, and is thoroughly familiar with conditions there. She passed through the siege of Tien Tsin, during the Boxer uprising, in which so many missionaries and native Christians lost their lives. She has a most interesting message and is a speaker of rare power. For five years she represented the Woman's Foreign Missionary Society of the Methodist Episcopal Church in the middle west, speaking at conventions and conferences in the interest of the work. This will be a splendid opportunity to hear one who can speak from first-hand knowledge of the history and present conditions in this great nation on whose fate hang so much of the future of the world. All women of the city, especially members of missionary societies are invited.

EFFORTS MADE FOR LIKE LAWS

Pan - American Conference Brings out Strides Made In Last Year

WASHINGTON, Jan. 21.—A description of the accomplishment of the International High Commission toward promoting trade relations among the countries of the Americas was given to the Pan-American Financial conference held in Washington in 1915.

"Substantial ameliorations of methods of customs administration have been secured in various quarters," said Mr. Moore. "Regulations permitting the simultaneous loading and unloading of cargoes, and the advance preparation of cargoes, have been brought about in numerous countries."

"Progress has been made with the adoption of a uniform statistical classification of merchandise. Six countries have already taken favorable action, and two more are understood to be on the point of so doing."

"Every effort has been made to advance uniform legislation in regard to bills of exchange, checks, bills of lading, and warehouse receipts."

"We seem to be rapidly approaching the time when, so far as concerns bills of exchange, there will, in effect, be only two systems, in use in the Western Hemisphere, based, respectively, on The Hague Rules of 1912 and the United States Negotiable Instruments Act of 1916."

"The Commission has also been glad to observe a growing interest in the adoption of uniform legislation on the subject of warehouse receipts, as well as on that of conditional sales."

SEATTLE, Jan. 21.—By A. P.—General Pershing is inspecting Camp Lewis today.

From Tacoma he will go to California.

General Pershing will pass through Albany tomorrow on train No. 15, which arrives in Albany shortly before noon.

VIENNA, Jan. 21.—By A. P.—Soviet Russia has established telegraphic communication with the Bulgarian Bolsheviks where many communities have declared themselves independent of the government. Outbreaks are of daily occurrence throughout the country. Attacks on King Boris are feared.

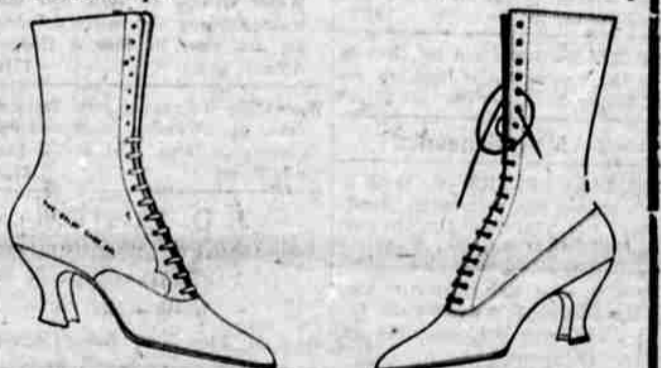
