

HOLLAND REFUSES TO SURRENDER TO ALLIES FORMER GERMAN EMPEROR

Dutch Government Declares it Cannot be Bound by Treaty of Which it has no Part in the Making.

BOUND BY HONOR

Statements Made Before Turkish Parliament Declare Turkey Decided to Enter Allies Side in War.

THE HAGUE, Jan. 23.—By the Associated Press.—The Dutch Government has refused the demand of the allied powers for the extradition of former Emperor William, of Germany.

LONDON, Jan. 23.—Holland's reply declares that she cannot be bound by a peace treaty of which she is not a party. Neither the Dutch constitution nor tradition will permit them to accede to the demand of the allies for the former emperor. The reply says that honor does not permit the betrayal of confidence of those who entrusted themselves to Holland and her free institutions.

Enver Pasha Held Guilty
CONSTANTINOPLE, Jan. 23.—Statements made before the secret parliamentary committee, published by newspapers today, claim that Turkey entered the war on Germany's side after the cabinet decided to join the allies. The machinations of the war party, led by Enver Pasha, then Minister of War, were held responsible for the change in front.

Vera Cruz, Mex., Rocked by More Earth Tremors

MEXICO CITY, Jan. 23.—By A. P.—Strong earthquake shocks were felt in the city of Vera Cruz yesterday morning. There were no casualties, but some residences were damaged. Reports state that the tremors demolished at Coztitlan all structures not destroyed in the earthquake of Jan. 6, while shocks lasting 20 minutes caused further damage at Salomoral and San Francisco de Lapenas.

The text was taken from the scene in the life of Christ, in which the woman who had suffered for many years and had no hope of relief, pressed through the crowd and touched the border of Christ's robe, and was instantly healed. The preacher pictured in strong terms the need of the woman, and the need of men and women today to get in touch with God, and assured his hearers that if they would come in faith the same healing of the spiritual life would be a accorded them that she received in her body.

At the invitation, one seeker came forward and knelt at the altar. In fact, there is hardly a service now that does not see conversions. It seems to be quite rising of the tide of resolution that is gripping all. Dr. Bowen's clear, incisive and earnest exhortations are producing in the church an aggressive spirit that is the beginning of an advance in Albany Methodism.

This afternoon, Mrs. Bowen, returned missionary from China addressed two meetings, one of the women at half-past two, and one of the children at four o'clock.

Tonight Dr. Bowen will preach his final sermon at a great young people's meeting. The message will be especially to young people, but will be profitable for all. There will be no service tomorrow night.

DANIELS TAKES ISSUE WITH BRYAN IN CONTROVERSY OVER GOVERNOR EDWARDS, OF NEW JERSEY TODAY

BELIEVES CHAIRMAN CUMMINGS, OF DEMOCRATIC NATIONAL COMMITTEE WAS WITHIN RIGHTS IN ACCEPTING INVITATION TO INAUGURATION; PLATFORM HELD GOOD.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 23.—By the Associated Press.—Secretary of the Navy Josephus Daniels today took issue with William Jennings Bryan, who stated that Chairman Homer Cummings, of the Democratic National Committee should disassociate himself from Governor Edwards, of New Jersey, who was elected on a wet platform, or resign the chairmanship.

Cummings attended the Governor's inaugural dinner where Edwards' presidential boom was launched. Secretary Daniels said that he had read Governor Edwards' platform and found at least 90 per cent of it "excellent and agreeing thoroughly with the best principles of Democratic statesmanship of the past and present."

Naturally, he said he could not agree with Edwards on prohibition, but this should not overshadow a good platform. He thought that Cummings acted in perfect propriety in accepting the invitation.

Mr. and Mrs. Clayton have been living temporarily at the Belmont rooming house, Second and Montgomery Streets. Their room is located near the front of the building and a window opens upon the hall. Last night when he retired Clayton placed his clothes on a trunk in front of the window.

About 7 o'clock this morning the Claytons were aroused by the flash of a light in the room. At first they thought nothing of it, but the thought soon struck Mr. Clayton and he jumped out of bed to find that his trousers had been searched, his gold watch and between \$30 and \$40 in money missing. He ran out of the door in time to see a figure hastening down the stairway in the darkness. He gave the alarm and the police were notified, but there is no way of identifying the culprit.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 23.—By A. P.—Charges that Attorney General Palmer "had a plain case of cold feet" when he failed to appear before the House rules committee to explain the need of further anti-sedition legislation, were made today by Representative Rodenburg, of Illinois, republican.

To Adjust Ship Claims

WASHINGTON, Jan. 23.—The Senate passed the bill authorizing the shipping board to adjust the claims of wooden shipbuilders growing out of the cancellation of contracts. The bill now goes to the house. The board estimated that the measure would affect \$15,000,000 in claims.

The Circuit Court Adjourns After Brief Session

Circuit court adjourned last night following the trial of F. J. Bartels against T. A. McCullough and others for the foreclosure of a lien on a mine in the Blue River district for services rendered in the development of the mine. The testimony was introduced in the form of written briefs and taken under advisement by the judge who will probably render a decision in the near future. The case of J. Ed. Spahner against J. J. Davis ordered dismissed on account of being settled out of court.

The case of Mrs. Eltha Turner against Dr. Lowell Jones and others was set for trial March 11.

STEINER RESIGNS FROM PRISON

Salem Man Named Warden of Penitentiary; Olcott Vetoes Salary Bills

SALEM, Ore., Jan. 23.—By A. P.—Dr. R. E. Lee Steiner today relinquished the wardenship of the state penitentiary with the Governor's consent and returned to his former position of superintendent of the State Hospital for the Insane.

The governor immediately names Louis M. Compton, state parole officer, as warden. Percy M. Varney, who resigned Monday as Chief of Police of Salem, succeeds Compton as parole officer. Dr. L. F. Griffith, who has been acting as superintendent of the state hospital resumes his post as assistant superintendent.

Salary Bill Vetoes

SALEM, Jan. 23.—Governor Olcott today vetoes the bill authorizing the state highway commission to increase the highway engineer's salary, which is now \$5,000. The governor vetoed all salary bills.

KNIGHT BOARD IS AGAINST DANIELS IN REGARD TO MAKING AWARDS

Admiral Knight Takes Issue With Naval Secretary Over Question of Handing out Medals.

ACTION IS NEEDED

Chairman of Board Would not Give Awards to Commanders of Ships Sunk Unless Enemy is Engaged.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 23.—By the Associated Press.—The Knight board was unable to agree with Secretary Daniels that naval officers who lost ships through submarines and performed meritorious service, should be awarded high decorations. Rear Admiral Knight, chairman of the board told the Senate investigating committee today.

Admiral Knight took sharp issue with Secretary Daniels, saying that officers losing ships were not entitled to high decorations unless they had engaged the enemy.

Delinquent Taxes To be Advertised February 6th

All delinquent taxes of real estate in the county will be published February 6th, reports Sheriff Kendall today. Those desiring to escape the penalty of the law should get busy and pay up before that time. The list is not published in the papers as under the old order of collecting taxes but simply printed in bill form and posted in the leading centers of the county. All property not paid on before the specified date will be sold to the county or individuals for delinquent taxes subject to the original owner redeeming the property before a specified time and paying the additional costs. No action will be taken at this date.

Mgr. W. M. Cook Sells Two Car Loads of the Farmers Stock

W. M. Cook, manager of the Linn county co-operative livestock association, returned from Portland last night where he sold two car loads of hogs, one deck of sheep, and one cow at top prices. He received 16 cents per pound for the hogs, 15 1/2 cents for sheep and 10.35 for the cow. Mr. Cook reports business good in his line.
