## Flu Epidemic In Chicago Is Declared Mild

CHICAGO, Jan. 23.—By A. P.—The epidemic of influenza and pneumonia from which over 10,000 Chicago persons are suffering continues to spread, but a slight increase in new cases is noted. The death list has increased, pneumonia causing 43 deaths and influenza 36.

The health commissioner urges calm, saying that the epidemic is in a mild form.

**Dangerous Counterfeit.**  
The most expert means of counterfeiting American greenbacks has been discovered by the state police in the Altrondacks lumber camps, where \$20, \$50 and \$100 notes were being duplicated. Banking experts have pronounced them the most clever counterfeits in existence.  
The information now in the hands of the state police is to be turned over to the United States department of justice. The secret of the device is a machine which is capable of splitting the thin note paper on which American notes are engraved and permitting the face and back of the note to be stripped from each other. Waxed paper is then laid over each half of the note and a solution applied to transfer enough of the original ink to the waxed paper to make an exact duplicate of the note. The waxed sections are then pasted to the opposite half of the good note and in this way two bank notes exactly alike are produced.

## SCHOOLS TAKEN TO COUNTRY

Extension Course to Hold Short Courses in Counties of State

O. A. C., CORVALLIS—Special—The extension department of the college has started a series of schools to be held in the various counties of the state. The schools will last for a week in each county and will be under the management of the extension service and county agents.

The schools started January 12. The first held will be in Coos and Washington counties. In Coos Professors E. L. Westover, of the dairy department, and W. L. Powers of the soils department will work in cooperation with C. C. Farr, county agent. During the week lectures will be given in three or four places in the county.

In Washington county schools will be held in two different places, conducted by E. B. Fitts of the dairy department and W. S. Carpenter in cooperation with N. C. Jameson, county agent.
