NEWBERRY ISSUE FEARED BY G. O. P.

Republican Senators Now Withhold Attention From Man From Michigan

WASHINGTON, D. C.—Special—The Newberry issue has been changed in the United States Senate. There isn't so much keenness to make Newberry a martyr to a political cause. Not so much eagerness is shown in Newberry's defense. There is more desire to permit the Federal court at Grand Rapids and the Senate Committee on Elections to determine whether Truman N. Newberry is entitled to a seat in the Senate.

It has been but a few weeks since Newberry returned to the Senate chamber for a short period. He was met at that time by Republican Senators with beaming countenances. His hand was pressed as every endeavor was made to convince those in the galleries that the Republicans were particularly fond of him, and to leave the impression that there was no cause for worry or alarm in the fact that he had just been indicted in a Michigan court for violation of the election laws.

Republicans Now Wary
Within the last few weeks, one of the three or four Republican leaders in the Senate, informed some of Newberry's associates in the cloak room that it might not be the part of wisdom to permit the inference that the

Republicans approved the expenditure of enormous sums of money to gain a Senatorial seat. It is admitted now as it has been all along, that more money than he can hope to obtain in salary during his lifetime, but the Republicans have been lax in condemning such practices.

That the Senate gradually is losing caste and that there is danger to our form of Government because of such stories as those circulated about Newberry is openly admitted. One Senator with a progressive turn of mind and with sincere ambition to serve his people, suggested recently that the only number which got hearty applause at a local vaudeville theater was a reflection upon the Senate and upon its work. His comment was inspired by an open letter published in a Washington paper from a plain citizen who called attention to the reports from the Newberry case and the vast expenditures of money which were stated to have been made in that election.

Newberry Issue Feared
The Republicans fear a Newberry issue in the next campaign. Immediately after Newberry came to the Senate and was forced into his seat by the Republican leaders, and effort was made to keep down any agitation for a review of the case. Eventually, Senator Kenyon of Iowa, a Republican, supported the Democratic demand for an investigation and the Republicans feared to make further open movements in Newberry's defense, though at no time did they press for an investigation.

No Republican clamor can remove the fact that the Republicans in control of Congress did not question Newberry's title to his seat in the Senate

notwithstanding the grave charges made against him. It will not be forgotten in the next campaign that month after month Newberry retained his seat and that he was permitted to vote upon important national questions. It will be remembered that if the Senate is to be discredited in this country, it will be because of the unwillingness of the Republicans to champion the cause of purity in elections.

Reports are reaching Washington from every state of the immense funds being gathered by Will H. Hays chairman of the Republican National Committee, and Republicans in charge of campaigns in special Congressional elections have stated that they were unable to spend all the money supplied to them. Evidences of this vast sum of money are furnished also by the heavy expenditures of the Republican National organization.

Begs Mothers To Drop Fight

ROCHESTER, N. Y.—Mrs. Oscar Gariessen, mother of the first American officer killed in France, has written an open letter to newspapers appealing to gold star women everywhere to oppose bringing home the bodies of soldier dead.

"I am a gold star mother," her letter, in part says, "who, when my son was killed in France (the first officer—at the very beginning of America's participation), hurried over there to work for the comfort of our Army. I am thoroughly acquainted with conditions there, and am so bitterly opposed to the impious and dreadful idea of bringing the bodies home, that I seek to enlist against it the gold star women of this land.

"I intend to publish a pamphlet, which I will gladly send gratuitously to any woman who will send me her name and address."

Hard Job to Keep Tab on Members Of Post in Paris

One of the more recent applicants for membership is Stefan Szumanski, now of Warsaw, but formerly a major of Engineers in the A. E. F. Szumanski proceeded to Poland after being demobilized last June. From Barcelona came the application of Robert Presnell, who is representing the National City Bank of New York there.
