WASHINGTON, Jan. 24—A. P.—By a margin of one vote the House appropriations committee refused to include in the deficiency appropriation bill fund on \$10,000,000 asked by the navy department for the repairs of ships. Naval officials said that unless the money is available that necessary repairs on capital ships and destroyers could not be made and 13,900 navy yard employes would have to be let out next month.
