

MOTION DENIED FOR CHANGE OF VENUE IN CASE AGAINST I. W. W.'S

Judge Wilson Refuses Attorney Vanderveer's Plea for New Trial Place for Centralia Murderers.

SECOND CHANGE ASKED

Counsel for Prosecution Attacks Character of Signers of Affidavits and Shows up Records as Slackers.

MONTESANO, Wash., Jan. 26.—By Associated Press.—Judge John M. Wilson in the circuit court here today denied the motion for a change of venue in the case against the 11 members of the I. W. W. held on the charge of murdering four ex-service men in the Centralia Armistice Day parade.

Judge Wilson, in denying the motion said that the motion made by the defense for the change was insufficient.

"The law does not permit a second change of venue in cases of this character in my opinion," he said.

W. H. Abel, counsel for the prosecution, attacked the character of two signers of affidavits presented by the defense. He declared that Roy Lam-pitt, of Hoquiam, who was an investigator for the defense had been a strike organizer and was arrested as a draft dodger. Joseph Schroyer was also a strike organizer, he claimed. Attorney Vanderveer said that organized labor is intensely interested in this trial.

In making his motion for a change of venue, Attorney Vanderveer offered as an exhibit clippings from north-western newspapers which he maintained tended to create prejudice against the defendants.

Rev. Father Olsen Opens Series of Meetings at St. Mary's Church

NO CHANGE IN ARTICLE 10 TO BE EUPUBLICANS SAYS ACCEPTABLE TO R LODGE TO DEMOCRATIC SENATORS

ANY CHANGE IN RESERVATIONS WILL NOT BE TOLERATED, HE ANNOUNCES AFTER CONFERENCE WITH BORAH; SOVIETS COULD FIGHT THE WORLD, SAYS AMBASSADOR; ITALIAN URGES REVOLUTION.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 26.—By Associated Press.—No change in reservations affecting Article 10 of the League of Nations covenant or the Monroe Doctrine provision of the treaty will be acceptable to Republicans, Senator Lodge informed Senator Hitchcock and other members of the informal Democratic committee which has been conferring with Lodge's committee in an effort to reach a compromise.

Senator Lodge's statement was issued after a conference with Senators Borah, Johnson and other Republicans opposing the treaty. The bi-partisan conference adjourned immediately.

Senator Hitchcock and associates retired for a private conference and will reply to Senator Lodge tomorrow.

"Reds Could Fight World"

WASHINGTON, Jan. 26.—A. P.—Russian Soviet organizations have become "strong enough to fight the

world," Ludwig C. A. K. Martens, Soviet agent to the United States told the Senate investigating committee.

Because of this, he said, the Soviets have ceased to urge an international revolution to support them. He said that the Soviets have "between \$450,000,000 and \$500,000,000" in their public treasury which it is now desired to spend in foreign countries to purchase necessities.

There is no gold now in the hands of banyas and private individuals in Russia.

Revolution is Urged

FLORENCE, Italy, Jan. 26.—A. P.—During a meeting at which the anarchist, Enrico Malatesta, recently elected to the Chamber of Deputies, urged a revolution, the mob tried to overcome a party of carabinieri. The latter, defending themselves, fired at the demonstrators, wounding a score.

ALBANY HIGH IS VICTOR IN GAME

Capital City Lads Lose Basket Ball Contest 23 to 19

Albany high school came out on top on the basket ball game played here Saturday evening with Salem high school. The score was 23 to 19 after the hardest kind of playing.

Albany's victory was due more to individual playing and to luck than to cohesive teamwork. Salem showed better in this one respect and had little trouble in taking the ball down the floor by passing or dribbling, but failed to score through the inability of her forwards to hit the basket and to the efficient guarding of the Albany backfield men. The local players showed a lack of practise in passing and carrying the ball down the field, but long shots brought the sphere into Salem territory frequently and the accuracy of Willard, Moore and Wilkerson piled up the points for the home team. Bussard and Haller played a stalwart game at guard and prevented the scoring of many baskets by the capital city lads.

Salem started off in the lead, making a foul and a basket before Albany scored. But Albany soon got to going and the first half ended with the score 14 to 5 in her favor.

Wilkerson opened the second half with a long shot from the center of the floor and Salem took a brace, making 14 points while Albany made five. The score at the end of the allotted time of play was 19 to 19 and another five minutes of play was agreed on, during which Albany made two more baskets and clinched the victory.

Salem was represented by B. Boise, center; G. Gill and Schaffer, forwards; Ashby and Gill, guards.

Harry Kueck officiated as referee in an impartial and efficient manner.

OREGON JERSEY COW IS WATCHED

F. A. Doerfler's Jersey Makes High Record in Milk Tests

NEW YORK, Jan. 26.—(Special to the Democrat)—F. A. Doerfler's Jersey herd at Silverton, Oregon, is frequently being brought into the limelight by the high records made by the animals in it. Several months ago Silver Chimes' Gwendola broke all Jersey yearling records, and now two more of the Doerfler Jerseys have completed official tests of more than 800 pounds fat.

At the record-breaking sale held by Ed Carey, of Carlton, Oregon, Mr. Doerfler purchased the top-priced animal, St. Mawes Boise Rosaire, for \$5100. This animal has now proven her value by producing 14,977 pounds milk and 891.54 pounds fat, beginning her test at the age of three years and seven months. This record is the second highest ever made by a senior-three-year-old Jersey.

Through her dam, Boise Queen, St. Mawes Boise Rosaire is a granddaughter of St. Mawes, one of the most noted Jersey bulls. The average production of St. Mawes' ten highest-testing daughters is 727 pounds fat. Boise Queen is also a Register of Merit cow with two official records. As a five-year-old she produced 11,285.7 pounds milk and 650.8 pounds fat; and during her second test, started in her seventh year, she produced 12,118.8 pounds milk and 745 pounds fat.

The sire of St. Mawes Boise Rosaire is Rosaire's Olga Lad. This bull has thirty daughters in the Register of Merit. One of them, Gwendola Rosaire, has just completed a test with 829 pounds fat.

Gwendola Rosaire had already completed two worthwhile records, but it is through her last, she earns a place in the class of high producers. Her three records in the order in which they were made are— Milk lbs. 7,724; Fat lbs. 414; Age 2 yrs 1 month, milk lbs. 11,415 fat, lbs. 648 age, 4 years and 5 months, milks lbs. 15,688; fat, lbs. 829; age, 6 years 3 months.

The first and last records are Class AA, as during these tests she carried a calf for 155 or more days. Koffee's Gwendola, the dam of Gwendola Rosaire, has a Register of Merit record of 10,901 pounds milk and 620 pounds fat made at the age of nine years and two months.

That it pays to breed along the right lines is evident from the records made by three Jerseys in the Doerfler herd, that are very closely related. St. Mawes Boise Rosaire and Gwendola Rosaire, both with records over 800 pounds fat, are half-sisters, and Silver Chimes, Gwendola, the former yearling Jersey champion, is a daughter of Gwendola Rosaire.

INAUGURATION AT ALBANY COLLEGE TO BE EVENT OF IMPORTANCE

Visitors to Come From Other Cities of Coast to Take Part in Ceremonies Installing President.

PROGRAM ARRANGED

Ceremonies Begin in Morning at College and Continue Through Day; Trustees Meet at Noon.

Tomorrow will be a big day in the history of Albany College when Rev. Alfred Melvin Williams will be formally inaugurated as president of the institution. Elaborate plans have been made for the ceremonies, which will last all day.

Dr. Wallace Howe Lee, past acting-president of the college and now dean, will preside at the chapel exercises at 10:30 Tuesday morning. The chapel address will be made by Rev. S. W. Seemann, D. D., of Seattle. At noon the board of trustees will hold a business meeting at luncheon at the St. Francis hotel. The speakers for the ceremonies will be entertained at dinner at the Hotel Albany at 12:30.

The academic procession, which will form at the college at 2:15 P. M. and proceed to the First Presbyterian church, will be one of the events of the day. In the procession will be the trustees, faculty, invited guests, alumni, students and representatives of other colleges. Every college in the country has been invited to be represented by some member of its alumni living in Oregon, and many have already accepted the invitation and appointed representatives.

The ceremonies at the church will be presided over by Rev. L. Myron Booser, of Medford. Miss Alice Clement will open the program with an organ selection, "Marche Pontificale," by Tombelle. Following the singing of the Doxology Dr. George H. Young will give the invocation. Prof. Chas. South will play a violin solo.

The inaugural address, "The Challenge of the Christian College to Thinking Men," will be delivered by Rev. Howard Agnew Johnston, D. D., Ph. D., of Chicago, who is at present supplying the pulpit of the First Presbyterian Church at Portland. Miss Mamie L. Lenhart will sing "O Thou That Bringest Good Tidings," by Handel.

Rev. Warren H. Landon, D. D., president of the Presbyterian Seminary at San Anselmo, Cal., will propose the inaugural questions.

Rev. W. O. Forbes, D. D., of Seattle, will offer prayer, following which the inducting charge will be given by Rev. Dr. Landon. President Williams will respond. Following a hymn there will be the conferring of degrees on candidates presented by Hon. Frank J. Miller, president of the board of trustees. President Williams will pronounce the benediction and Miss Clements will close the ceremonies at the organ, playing Postlude in F, by Stearns.

At 6:30 a complimentary dinner will be served to the trustees and visitors at the First Presbyterian church dining hall. Hon. F. J. Miller will be toastmaster and addresses will be made by Mayor L. M. Carl, Hon. B. L. Eddy, of Roseburg, one of the trustees; Judge Percy R. Kelly, who will deliver "Greetings from the Alumni," talks by Miss Ethel Redfield, Supt. of Public Instruction of Idaho; Hon. J. A. Churchill, Supt. of Public Instruction of Oregon, and felicitations from visiting colleges and friends by others present.

Blain Given Two Weeks to Plead
