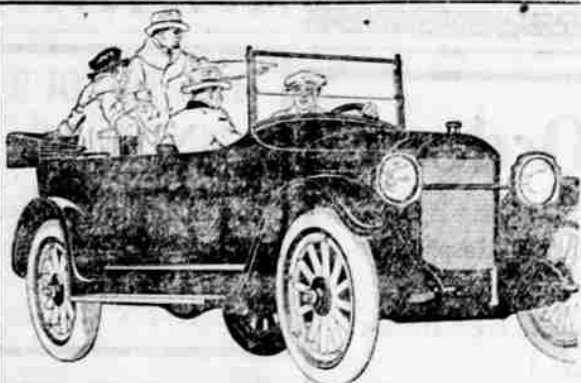

He attended The Dalles high school and later graduated from the University of Oregon school of Journalism. During his residence here he has been prominent in American Legion affairs and represented Alfred E. Babcock Post at the national convention at Minneapolis in November. He has made many friends in Albany and in his leaving the city loses an able and clever member of the journalistic profession.

Wm. Huddleson Dies Laughing At Mill City

MILL CITY, Ore., Jan. 26.—(Special)—William Huddleson, a member of a pioneer Linn County family, died at his home at Mill City last Wednesday of apoplexy. Mr. Huddleson was sitting with a group of friends, laughing and joking, when he suddenly fell over dead.

The funeral was conducted by Wm. Weddie, station funeral director, Friday and burial took place in King's Prairie cemetery. Mr. Huddleson was about 54 years old. His father was a pioneer settler of the Waterloo neighborhood, where the family lived for many years. At the time J. K. Weatherford and Thos. B. Kay, of Salem ran the Waterloo Woolen Mills, Mr. Huddleson was an employ of the firm. He was a member of Gates lodge, I. O. O. F., and had been a resident of Mill City for many years.

the divinity of Christ the Son of the living God? Have they not ridiculed the ancient and proven teachings of the Virgin birth, of Christ's power of miracles and of the supernatural character of the church and religion? From this it has been an easy and quick step to free and easy living, to open immorality to a disregard of the vows of marriage, divorce, which all Americans are agreed in calling the curse of modern society."

"Living for themselves and not for God, men have given themselves over to vice, to dishonesty, to blasphemy and to nameless crimes.

"The remedy is one and one only, namely a return to Christ and the Gospel teachings. To this end all Catholic men are bidden by the church and the chief bishop, Benedict the Fifteenth, to rally to the standard of the Holy Name Society, which was unfurled just seven centuries ago by Gregory the Tenth at the council of Lyons, to meet and conquer the evils which we have named."

Following yesterday's services, the missionary presided at a meeting of the Holy Name Society at which the following officers were elected:

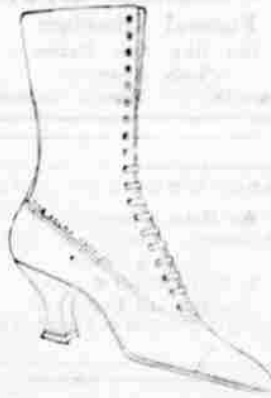
