

NEWBERRY TRIAL OPENS AT GRAND RAPIDS, MICHIGAN 134 ARE INDICTED

Sensational Trial of United States Senator who Defeated Henry Ford is Promised; Corrupt Practise.

MANY ARE IMPLICATED

Newberry Charged with Spending Nearly a Million Dollars; One Country Editor Receives Paper.

GRAND RAPIDS, Mich., Jan. 27.—By the Associated Press.—United States Senator Truman H. Newberry and 123 prominent politicians went on trial today charged with conspiracy, fraud and corruption in the Senatorial election of 1918 when Newberry defeated Henry Ford in their race for the United States Senate.

Chief Catlin states that quarantine rules will be rigidly enforced, violators being liable to a fine of \$100 for disobeying orders of the health officer.

REV. A. M. WILLIAMS IS FORMALLY INAUGURATED PRESIDENT OF ONE OF OLEST COLLEGES ON COAST

IMPRESSIVE CEREMONIALS MARK INDUCTION OF HEAD OF ALBANY COLLEGE INTO OFFICE; CHICAGO MAN MAKES ADDRESS; MANY VISITORS HERE; DEGREES CONFERRED UPON 3 PASTORS; DINNER IS TONIGHT.

It is now President A. M. Williams, of Albany College. This afternoon Dr. Warren H. Landon, of San Anselmo, Cal., pronounced the word which made the newly elected head of one of the oldest educational institutions on the coast, the recognized president of this temple of learning.

The inauguration is being attended by friends of the college and high church officials from all over the Pacific coast and the academic procession from the college to the First Presbyterian church contained representatives of many other schools and colleges of the country.

This morning at chapel Dr. S. W. Seemann, of Seattle, delivered a masterly address. The speakers of the day were entertained at luncheon at the Albany Hotel.

The board of trustees met at the St. Francis Hotel at 12:30 and voted to confer the degree of Doctor of Divinity upon Rev. Earl DuBois, pastor of the Grand Avenue United Presbyterian church, of Portland; Rev. L. Myron Booser, of the First Presbyterian church, of Medford and Rev. Wallace Howe Lee, of Albany College. The degrees were formally conferred this afternoon. Mon F. J. Miller, president of the board of trustees of the college making the presentation.

An announcement of importance to the church was made today when a message was received stating that the General Board of Education of the First Presbyterian Church had endorsed the proposal to give equal control of the college to the United Presbyterian church. The matter had already been endorsed by the local board and the Synod of Oregon. Now the matter

goes before the United Presbyterian church for their approval. The double control of the college would greatly strengthen it from a moral and financial standpoint.

The program at the church this afternoon, at which President Williams was formally installed as President of the college, was impressive. Mr. L. Myron Booser, of Medford, presided. Dr. George H. Young offered prayer.

The inaugural address was delivered by Dr. Howard Agnew Johnston, of Chicago, the full text of his subject, "The Challenge of the Christian College to Thinking Men" appearing elsewhere in today's paper.

President Williams responded in a most eloquent manner, taking as his subject, "I believe: Therefore I have Spoken," and touched on his belief in God, his belief in the God of Providence, in the God of Redemption, in the Presbyterian church, in the Synod of Oregon, and in the people of Albany.

"Albany College is, after all," he said, "the kind of a college that has proved itself from the foundation of America." In announcing the future policy of the college President Williams spoke for a democratic government in the institution, building up the resources of the college, broadening its course of study and the proposal to divide the management of the school, with the United Presbyterian church. The Democrat regrets not being able to get all of President Williams' speech into type today.

This evening at the church there will be a complimentary dinner to the trustees, visiting pastors and speakers, alumni and students of the college.

HIGHER PRICED FOOD PREDICTED

COMPROMISE STILL IN DOUBT

Bi-Partisan Conference on Treaty Ends Without Decision; Meet Thursday

WASHINGTON, Jan. 27.—By A. P.—The fate of the compromise negotiations on the treaty remained doubtful after the bi-partisan conference had discussed it without a decision and the republicans refusal of a compromise of article 10. Another meeting will be held Thursday.

Democratic leaders expressed surprise at the Republican stand, saying that most members of the conference had assented to a compromise on Article 10.

Holland May Get Mandate

PARIS, Jan. 27.—A. P.—In case the United States refuses to accept the mandate for Armenia it may be given to Holland, it is reported.

Madison School Closed on Account Of Scarlet Fever

The Madison school of this city was ordered closed today and is being fumigated on account of a case of scarlet fever which broke out. The matter is not taken as serious and by having the house fumigated all danger is removed and the school is expected to be in session in a very short time.

Corvallis Short In Census Report

O. A. C. CORVALLIS — A final checking up of census returns for the city of Corvallis on the last day in which names could be registered, disclosed the fact that 1240 persons had been overlooked in the original enumeration. This check was taken by 16 teams of men from the commerce department of the college.

PURE BRED STOCK MEN GET BUSY

Association Organizes for Work During Coming Year

The Directors of the Linn County Purebred Livestock Association met in Albany last Saturday and voted to print a directory of all members of the organization, giving the breed of stock or poultry raised which will be mailed to all county agents, commercial clubs, banks and livestock associations of the state. E. H. Holloway, C. C. Cole and Geo. McCart were appointed a committee to carry out the plan. Boys and Girls Industrial clubs will be encouraged and all members of clubs admitted at a reduced rate in the association of the county.

In charge of this work, W. H. McConnell, E. G. Shoel and M. Averhoff were appointed. The association will hold public sales in the county at such times and places as sufficient stock can be accumulated to justify. The board of directors is to have charge of all such sales. The next meeting will be held in Albany, February 21. A good interest is reported in the county and great development is anticipated in the livestock industry.

SUPREME COURT AFFIRMS DECISION

Coos, Benton and Clatsop County Decisions Affirmed by Higher Court

SAMEL, Jan. 27.—By A. P.—The Supreme Court today affirmed the decision of Judge Coke, of Coos County, in the case of Katherine M. Thimsen against Charles Reigard, regarding the trusteeship for certain lands and stocks. The decision was in favor of Thimsen.

The court affirmed the decision of Judge Skipworth, of Eugene, in the Benton county case of Theodore Miller against William Bindshadler, suit to foreclose on a contract. The decision was in favor of Miller.

Judge Eakin's decision was affirmed in the case of Clatsop County against Marija Gustava Wuopie, action to recover money upon an undertaking of bail. The decision favors the county.

ALBANY LUMBER CO. IS SOLD TO OUTSIDE CAPITAL; TO BE ENLARGED

Local Sawmill Sold to J. P. Van Orsdel and Associates Who Will More Than Double Capacity of Plant.

PRICE ABOUT \$45,000

Building up of Local Institution Means Bigger Payroll for City; New Machinery to be Installed Soon.

A deal which will affect the future prosperity and growth of the city was closed here yesterday when the Albany Lumber Company was taken over by J. P. Van Orsdel and associates.

Mr. Van Orsdel is manager of the Coast Range Lumber Co., with headquarters at Mabel, Ore., but his company was not directly interested in the present deal. Some of the biggest timber and logging men in the state are interested in the company taking over the Albany mill, which argues well for the future of the concern.

The price paid for the property will be in the neighborhood of \$45,000, an invoice of the stock of lumber determining the exact amount. The sale includes mill, yards, machinery, logging outfits, contracts, etc. The new owners will take hold immediately and the rebuilding of the mill will begin at once.

The old officers of the mill were J. J. Barrett, president, W. A. Noon, secretary, and Alex. Ross, manager. Mr. Ross will be retained at the local mill. He is one of the best mill managers in the state and his services will be continued in that capacity.

While full announcement of the sale could not be given out today, it is known that the immediate enlargement of the mill will be undertaken and that within 90 days the present capacity of 40,000 feet per day will be more than doubled. New boilers will be put in first, then new planers, re-saws, and other equipment until the plant will be able to handle a greater output of lumber. This will mean a corresponding increase in the payroll and will bring the Albany mill up to one of the largest in the upper Willamette valley.

City Fire Alarm System Out Says Fire Chief Clark

Fire chief, Clark Price, announces that the wind Saturday night has disorganized the fire alarm system of the city and for the next few days it will be necessary to phone in all fire alarms. The system is out of order and not to be depended on until repaired. Several recent alarms have been caused by the system being out of fix.

Chicago Epidemic Shows Abatement

CHICAGO, Jan. 27.—A. P.—Health officers reported new cases scarcer but the death toll is climbing. There were 173 deaths from pneumonia and influenza in the last 24 hour period.

Farming Editor To be Secretary Of Agriculture

WASHINGTON, Jan. 27.—By A. P.—Edwin T. Meredith, editor of "Successful Farming," will be named Secretary of Agriculture to succeed Secretary Houston, who is to become secretary of the treasury in place of Carter Glass.

Wilson Again Is Asked to Keep Road Control

WASHINGTON, Jan. 27.—By A. P.—Representatives of farmers organizations, the American Federation of Labor and the big four brotherhoods again asked President Wilson to continue the government control of railroads for at least two years.
