Sacrifice Held Necessary To Christian Life

Taking a phrase from the language of the officers of the law, Rev. J. C. Spencer, pastor of the Methodist church, spoke Sunday night on "Caught with the goods." He said that often the very things on which we rely to prove our responsibility and morality form the surest and most severe indictment against us, and used as the basis of his sermon the incident in the life of Saul, King of Israel, in which he claimed to have done the will of God, but was betrayed by the blessing of the sheep and the lowering of the cattle which he had saved to sacrifice.

"There are times" said the minister, "when the possession of money that should have been used for the benefit of others, is the surest evidence of the selfishness of the possessor, when the possession of strength or even life itself ought to shame one, because the true spirit of Christian life demands that it be used for the good of others."

He told the strong man who, in the terrible fire in a theatre in Chicago fought his way to safety by trampling on women and children, and contrasted with him the young college student who, at the expense of his own life, saved fourteen from death. "This," he said, "was following in the footsteps of Him who saved others, but himself he could not, because he would not, save."
