Of Interest To Women

In Turkey, Syria, and Armenia the women wear garments of celestial blue as an emblem of mourning.

The Catholic women of Chicago propose to erect The Rosary College, in one of the suburbs, at a cost of \$500,000.

Nearly all the women in the Punjab can embroider exquisitely in silk or cotton. The work is chiefly done for wrappers and veils, for their own use.

Cigarettes for ladies are an established institution in Spain. The senoras hold them by a little silver wire twisted at one end into a hoop through which the cigarette is passed.

"George Sand" one of the most successful of French women novelists, earned more than a quarter of a million dollars with her pen, and spent virtually all of it, largely in entertaining her friends.

Henrietta Wolters, born at Amsterdam in 1692, was one of the first women to attain eminence as a painter. Peter the Great sat to her for his portrait, and was desirous to secure her services, but she refused to leave her own country.

Siam has a city composed exclusively of women, where the manufacture of silk and cotton stockings is carried on. The husbands of the women are not permitted to enter, but are obliged to live outside the city walls.

The "First Women's Bank in Tennessee" is the name of an institution organized and financed by women of Clarksville, Tenn. The bank is capitalized at \$15,000 and will do a general banking business, with special refer-

ence, however, to the financial conveniences of women.

Farmerettes were known to America as far back as the days of the American Revolution, when numerous women in New York and Carolina formed themselves into bands and, going from farm to farm, reaped the wheat harvest, asking only, "Are the men of the family out with the fighting men?"

A court lady in the time of Queen Elizabeth wore a low dress with a long stomacher, an immense ruffle around her neck, a small hat, crinoline, a large fan of ostrich feathers with a mirror attached, highly scented gloves, and frequently a velvet mask. Her feet were shod with pumps of scented Spanish leather, her hair dyed red in imitation of the royal locks, and her face was painted and rouged.

Every census of the United States has disclosed women engaged in all kinds of old and unusual occupations, and the census just taken is expected to be no exception to the rule. It is difficult to conceive, however, that it will bring to light any female vocations more curious than those recorded in the Federal census of fifty years ago, which showed that women were then engaged in earning a livelihood as professional hunters and trappers, stock herders, hostlers, draymen, steamboat pilots, guano laborers, gunsmiths, gas-stokers, gunpowder makers, and ship riggers.

RUTH ST. DENIS TO APPEAR IN PERSON

Noted Terpsichorean Artist and Company Coming to Globe Next Tuesday

The Globe theatre offers its local patrons a theatrical treat of more than ordinary merit; is Ruth St. Denis and her company of artistic dancers and musicians who are to appear here next Tuesday.

When John Philipp Sousa and his band came to Albany many a doubting Thomas stayed home, not believing that the one and only John Sousa would appear in Albany. But he did and was more than pleased with the city and gave his best. The same thing is taking place with regard to Ruth St. Denis. It is in conceivable to some that an artist with the international reputation of Miss St. Denis should come to a city of this size. But Albany has had Margaret Illington, Guy Post, May Robson, and countless others and will have Ruth St. Denis in person next Tuesday.

"The program of music visualization given by the Ruth St. Denis concert dancers recently at the Egan Little Theatre was one of the most artistic terpsichorean offerings of the season, says the Los Angeles Express. "The program with its richness of variety had a more interesting tinge in many respects than the recent offerings of the Duncan dancers.

Months of careful study and effort were shown in the highly artistic work offered by the students and great credit is due Miss St. Denis, whose richness of professional technique and experience made the visualization possible.

In solo work Doris Humphrey, Betty May, Ruth Austin and Claire Nines gave unusual interpretation of music moods of the represented composers, and the ensemble work was rich in its imagery, grouping, imaginative coloring, costuming and lighting.

Ellis Rhodes, well-known tenor who will tour with the dancers, sang a group of songs with keen dramatic sense, good taste and musical discrimination. The taxing work of accompanying dancers and singer was most efficiently accomplished by Pauline Lawrence."

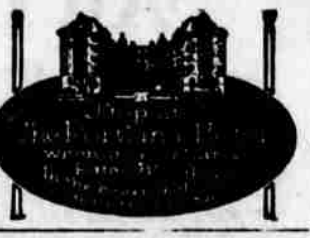
