TODAY'S EVENTS

(Thursday, January 29, 1920)
 Observance of Carnation Day, in a memory of the late President McKinley.
 Kansas celebrates today the beginning of the sixtieth year of her Statehood.
 Senator Harding of Ohio and Congressman Cannon of Illinois are to be speakers at the McKinley Day exercises to be held today at the McKinley Memorial at Niles, O.
 Kansas Republicans are to hold their annual Kansas Day rally and banquet in Topeka tonight, with Congressman Frank Reavis of Nebraska scheduled as the chief speaker.
 A call has been issued for Kentucky women to meet in Louisville today to discuss co-operation in the plans of the Federal Government to reduce the cost of living.
 The State Democratic executive committee of Florida meets at Jacksonville today to arrange for the primary election to choose state and congressional tickets and delegates to the national convention.
 Florida Republicans have issued a call for State and congressional conventions to be held at Palatka today to nominate candidates for offices to be filed at the next election and to choose delegates to the Chicago convention.
 More than the usual number of important problems relating to present

political, financial and economic conditions are expected to receive attention at the hands of the British Columbia legislature which has been summoned to meet today.
 The preliminary statement on industrial arbitration formulated by President Wilson's industrial conference is to furnish the leading topic of discussion at the annual session of the National Civic Federation, opening in New York City.

 Wrestling is in high favor at Harvard just now, the varsity matmen preparing for meets with the grapplers of Princeton, Brown and Yale.
 Tommy O'Brien, the California lightweight, appears to be at least 50 per cent better on the Pacific coast than he showed in his bouts in the East.
 According to Manager Griffith of the Washington team, Pitcher Walter Johnson never has a sore arm, even during the Spring training period.
 From the Mike O'Dowd is traveling at the present time it's going to be some job for any boxer to take the middleweight title away from the St. Paul Battler.

Of Interest To Women

Women in China are liberal patrons of the motion picture shows.
 In the United States there are now eleven women members of State legislature in five different states.
 Two thousand women are attending the University of Warsaw, the most of them studying law or medicine.
 The first week of Many has been chosen by the International Woman Suffrage Alliance as the time for holding its world congress in Madrid.
 A three-thousand-dollar-a-year woman is Miss Rose Pedrick, whose position is that of secretary to the Deputy Transit Commissioner of New York City.
 Germany now has fifty-eight women lawmakers, thirty-six of whom sit in the Federal parliament and twenty-two in the legislatures of the different states.
 The Marguerite League club, an organization of 700 girls employed in one of the suburbs of Pittsburgh, is planning to build an up-to-date club-house of its own.
 The agricultural society of Prince William County, Virginia, has set up a precedent in the Old Dominion by electing three women to membership on the county fair board.
 Mrs. Henry M. Youmans of Waukesha, well known for her work in the suffrage cause, is the new chairman of the Wisconsin division of the Women's National Republican committee.
 Although women in Australia have been eligible to hold public office for some years, no representative of the sex has yet been elected to the Parliament of the Commonwealth.
 Miss Alice Masaryk, daughter of the President of the new Tzecho-Slovakian Republic, has resigned her seat in parliament in order to devote her whole time to the work of the Red Cross.
 Mrs. Margaret Hill McCarter of Topeka, well known as an author and also as one of the leading Republican women of the country, will share with the Governors of Minnesota and Illinois the honor of being a speaker at the Lincoln club banquet in Grand Rapids next month.
