**First Automobile Window Appears At Sternberg's**

The first decorated window display in the Automobile Dealer's Association contest to appear is that of M. Sternberg & Co.'s women's shop at First and Lyon Streets. The work was done by Russell Gott and is in keeping with his usual high standard of window trimming.

The centerpiece is a large water-color painting on canvas representing the progress of the automobile industry. The figure of a woman is holding in outstretched hands the first automobile model made by Haynes some twenty years ago, and one of the latest 1920 models. The work is in colors and carries out the spirit of the day.

In the window are figures of women garbed in automobile apparel and surrounding them are tires and accessories and dozens of catalogs of all makes of automobiles sold in this city. The background, which is apt to be unobserved because it is unpretentious, is a beautiful landscape vista done in soft tones so that it makes a pretty setting for the display, but in no way interferes with the main object of the display, to attract attention to the goods on display.

Other artistic windows are expected to appear in competition for the prizes offered.

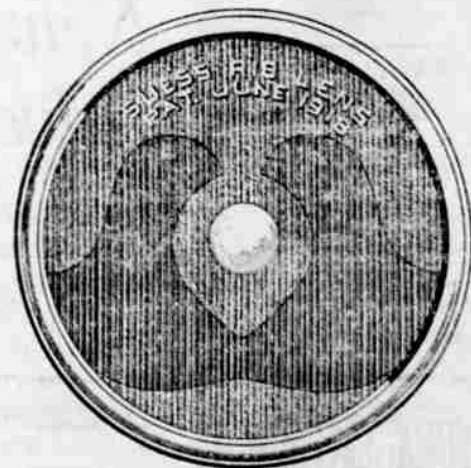
