Public Invited to Attend Program at K. C. Hall This Evening

An open meeting of the Friends of Irish Freedom will be held at 7:15 this evening in the Knights of Columbus hall 822 Ellsworth St., to which the public generally is invited. A program of Irish songs and melodies will be given, followed by several brief talks on the Irish question.

"All who are interested in this subject from whatever viewpoint it may be, are cordially invited to attend this meeting," says Rev. Father Lane. "The committee would indeed welcome an exchange of views on the subject representing the pro and con of the question."

"The Friends of Irish Freedom do not believe it possible that any one who understands the question could continue to view it as a religious issue. In their eyes it is both unfair and unjust to oppose so worthy a cause as the Independence of Ireland, because of such an issue, which in this case seems to them entirely fictitious. There is no man who stands for fair play as enthusiastically as an American and it is to this American sense of fairness that the Friends of Irish Freedom commend the consideration of this question."
