## FORMAL DEMAND FOR THOSE WHO ARE ACCUSED OF CRIMES IS MADE

List is Handed German Representatives at Paris Today and Will go Forward to Berlin Government.

## MANY PRINCES NAMED

Sons of Former Emperor Head List Which Includes Leading Generals and Statesmen.

PARIS, Feb. 3.—By the Associated Press.—The list of Germans accused by the allies of war crimes and whose extradition is demanded, is headed by the former Crown Prince Frederick William and several other sons of the former emperor. The list was handed to German representatives today. Von Bethmann-Hollweg, former Chancellor; Generals von Hindenburg, Ludendorff, von Mackensen, Prince Rupprecht, the Duke of Wartenburg and a number of other titles officers and princes are also wanted.

## DANIELS ASSERTS THAT ADMIRAL SIMS IS MORE OF A SHORE MAN THAN A FIGHTER ON DEEP SEAS

NAVAL SECRETARY TAKES UP CONTENTIONS OF ADMIRAL SIMS BEFORE SENATE COMMITTEE AND GIVES VIEWS ON SQUABBLE; TROUBLE BETWEEN SIMS AND ADMIRAL WILSON LED TO SLIGHT, SAYS SECRETARY.

WASHINGTON, Feb. 3.—By the Associated Press.—Taking up the contentions of Rear Admiral Sims, Josephus Daniels, secretary of the navy took emphatic issue with the admiral before the Senate committee today. Secretary Daniels asserted that Admiral Sims on shore duty in the Spanish-American and the World War "demonstrated ability of a high order" and "his own record non doubt influenced Sims in placing shore duty above sea duty in the danger zone." He showed that during the last 25 years Admiral Sims served about nine years at sea. Daniels pointed out that ashore a man decides important questions with time to weigh the pro and cons, while at sea a commander is in

imminent danger of death and must make momentous decisions in a flash, often when a ship is attacked and a mistake would be fatal. He declares that chivalry, coolness, preparation and foresight after a commander's ship had been struck by a submarine deserves the highest awards. Secretary Daniels said that personal differences developing between Admiral Sims and Henry B. Wilson, former commander of the American naval forces off the French coast, led Sims to omit Wilson's name from the list of officers recommended for medals by Sims. Daniels said that "who, the history of the war is written that Admiral Wilson's service will stand as high as that of Admiral Sims Mayo, Benson and Rodman."

## IRISH QUESTION IS DISCUSSED

Meeting as K. C. Hall Hears Statements on Timely Topic

The Friends of Irish Freedom held open house to their friends and the public generally at a crowded meeting in the K. of C. hall last night. The music, the decorations and the speeches were distinctly Irish and even the costumes of the young performers and the appointments of the lunch tables were set off with the Irish colors.

The purpose of the meeting, as stated by President Henry Lyons, was to explain the Irish question, to show the justice of her claims to independence and to win sympathy to her cause. In the absence of the principal, Father Cualey of Monroe, Father Lane spoke briefly of the religious issue which has been connected with the question, particularly of late. After showing that almost half the population of Ulster stands for the freedom of Ireland, Father Lane stated that the Irish in the past were protestants, as are many of the leading Irish republicans of today. To name a few of these patriots—not one a Catholic, he spoke of Grafton, Wolfe, Tono, Lord Fitzgerald, John Mitchell, Robert Emmet and P. O'Connell. Again there is the protestant, Francis McKinley, uncle of the late President McKinley, who was hanged and martyred as a traitor and died bravely for the cause of a Free Ireland.

Far from the Pope's giving aid to the Irish in their struggle for independence, the Irish felt that the present Pontiff was strictly neutral, while Leo XIII had disapproved their earlier efforts to obtain their freedom. This in fact had been admitted by the leading Orangemen themselves. In conclusion Father Lane deprecated the fact that the religious boggy was again set loose to disturb and perplex the peoples of two continents.

## Aggie Athletes Training For Track Events

CORVALLIS, Ore.—Oregon Agricultural college track athletes, now that the football season has ended, are beginning to look forward to the winter track season. The contest of the indoor season being the Far-Western indoor meet to be held Apr. 3, in the O. A. C. armory here.

Talent for this year's track team will include a long list of last year's varsity men, besides a number of freshmen and sophomores. Carter and Green, apparently, will be the team's sprinters. Carter has several 100-yard dash firsts to his credit. Kirn and Bob McClanathan are the 440-yard contestants, while Lee Durham, Reynolds and Bryant are 880-yard contenders. Grant Swan appears to be the lone miler, while there are two who may enter the two-mile races, McCormick and Bullard. Elkeman and Reardon are the veteran hurdlers, the former also being a contender for field event honors.

## CLUB WOMEN ARE ASKED TO HELP

Lists of Available Nurses in Oregon are Wanted by Officers

The following letter has been received, asking Albany and Linn county to secure a list of available nurses as a precautionary measure in case an epidemic breaks out.

To the Presidents of the Federated Clubs of Oregon—  
A request has come from Dr. David N. Roberg, State Health Officer, that a list of all available nurses, either trained or practical, from your respective neighborhoods or districts, be sent at once to your county and city health officers.  
In case of need, each community will have to depend upon itself for nurses. According to the Surgeon-General of the U. S. Public Health Service, there is no money available to dispatch physicians or nurses over the state in case of emergency.  
This is only a measure of preparedness, and I want to ask the co-operation of the Federated Clubs of Oregon with the State Board of Health in this matter.

## NEW REVOLUTION IN NICARAGUA

Revolutionists Reported Defeated in Battle With Federal Troops

MANAGUA, Nicaragua, Feb. 3.—By A. P.—There has been a fresh revolutionary outbreak in Honduras, according to advices. The revolutionists, headed by Don Alberto Mombreno, former vice-president of Honduras and Dr. Nazario Soriano suffered heavy defeat at the hands of government forces and are now retiring toward the Nicaraguan frontier, it is reported.

## D'ANNUNZIO IS AT IT AGAIN

Soldier-Poet Captures Two Italian Naval Vessels With Supplies

TRIESTE, Feb. 3. (by A. P.)—Gabriele D'Annunzio has seized the torpedo boat Orsini and the auxiliary ship Citti Di Roma, bound from Ancona to Pola with munitions and food-stuffs for the Italian naval forces. The vessels were brought into Fiume.

## Rioting Reported At Limerick

LONDON, Feb. 3. (by A. P.)—Major-General Graves, commanding the American forces in Siberia, reported that revolutionists have entered Valdivostok and captured the town. The crowds are orderly, the allied forces patrolling the streets and protecting innocent people and preventing looting.  
The revolutionists platform declared for an end of civil war and interference by foreigners in internal affairs of Siberia.

## OLCOTT NAMES SENATOR DAY ON COMMISSION TO LOOK OVER ROAD

Portland Contractor to Help Decide on Feasibility of Removing DesChutes Road and Building Road.

## THOUGHT POSSIBLE

Two Rail Lines to Bend From Columbia River Held Excessive; Roadbed Would Make Good Highway.

(By Associated Press)

SALEM, Ore., Feb. 3.—Governor Olcott today appointed Senator I. N. Day, of Portland, a member of the legislation commission to investigate the feasibility of removing one of the two railroads now extending from the O. W. R. & N. and Northern Pacific lines on the Columbia River to Bend and extending the other line from Bend to Kamath Falls.

The plan would be to use the bed of the road removed for the state highway. The other members of the commission are Senator Roy Ritner, of Pendleton and Representative Brudick, of Redmond.

The argument is advanced that two roads paralleling the Des Chutes river are not needed and that the road bed now occupied by one is graded and would require but little additional work for paving.  
The two roads were built in 1909 following a dash to reach the central part of Oregon first, and the construction occasioned much strife and many feuds.

## Idaho Making Plans For Good Team This Fall

MOSCOW, Idaho — Plans for obtaining the best man available to take charge of the University of Idaho football squad next season are being formulated by a special committee of students, alumni and faculty members named by President F. H. Lindley to select a coach.

Dean C. P. Cockerill, one of the faculty members of the committee, recently returned from an eastern trip during which he interviewed a number of coaches of middle western colleges with a view to getting a line on a desirable man for the Idaho coaching berth.

## Bruce Evans is Popular Again On Second Night

Last night at the Baptist church Bruce Evans, the famous evangelist lived up to his record of amusing the audience. He seems to be the one man who can attract the crowd on Monday night, but there was no let up. The people want to get the most out of Bruce from the beginning.

To the interested audience he preached a powerful sermon on "Pecoring" and drove home his points with both comic and tragic effect, the people breaking out into applause at his real western style of preaching. He is a preacher with effect and gives a punch to his message.

One main feature last night was the large number of men present. One of them a prominent citizen said, Bruce is the most interesting preacher I ever heard.
