Albany Woman's Sister Victim of Sleeping Malady

The Ashland Tidings gives the following account of the sister of Mrs. Clate Springer of this city who is the victim of "Sleeping Sickness" as a result of the influenza.

"Making a recovery from what is called an authentic case of 'sleeping sickness,' Mrs. William Hile, chief operator of the local telephone office, is gradually regaining her health after a sleep that has lasted six weeks or over. She has practically regained consciousness and sleeps now naturally.

"Mrs. Hile had been ailing since the first of December, it is said, but about the middle of the month she fell into a stupor in which she lay until about ten days ago, since her return to normal consciousness has been gradual, and at present she is able to sit up a short time each day.

"Not at any time during her illness has it been impossible to rouse Mrs. Hile from her constant sleep, it is stated, and in that way she has been able to take nourishment which has kept up her strength. It is said the case is one of the first to be seen in this section."

Mrs. Springer states that her sister is the victim of influenza.

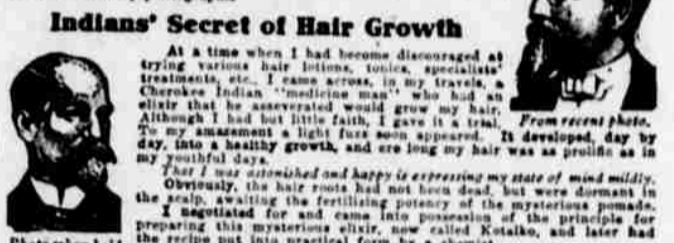
