The Battery Cannot Return More Than It Receives

An automobile storage battery is like one bank account. One cannot draw out more than is put into it and still avoid trouble, for sooner or later the "drafts" will not be honored. Yet, in the case of thousands of batteries, this sort of procedure is being attempted, during this season of long nights and cold days—the demand for stored current is allowed to exceed the total of effective charging current furnished, and the supply of stored electrical energy becomes exhausted, or, in other words, the electrical account becomes "overdrawn." There are just two ways in which to relieve this situation, namely: To put more current in or to take less current out. In order to effect the former, the following suggestions are made: So adjust the regulation of the generator that it shall produce a greater charging current, or, in other words, increase its charging rate. This can be done on practically all modern generators—on those having third brush regulation by readjusting the third brush position and on those with field resistance control, by re-setting the voltage control magnet. Give the battery more time to do its charging, by operating the car, at least, part of the time, on second speed, with the engine running just fast enough to develop the normal charging rate. This practice alone will usually keep a battery at full charge. Running the engine idle, merely for charging purposes, is not to be recommended, because it too expensive and bothersome. Charge the battery from an external source of current when necessary, which should, by the way, be very seldom, if the charging rate is adequate and the battery itself in good condition. If outside charging is frequently necessary, it is better to own a small rectifier than to be continually taking the battery to a charging station. The following suggestions may enable the demand for current to be reduced: Use the lights only when required and use the small headlight bulbs or the dimmer when admissible. Replace very large headlight bulbs by smaller ones. Temporarily discontinue the use of electrical accessories, such as cigar-lighters, spot lights, trouble-lamps and electrical vulcanizers. Be sure there are no internal short-circuits in the battery. Avoid leaving the ignition switch on, when engine is idle. Provide a warm place for the car, so that low temperature shall not reduce battery efficiency or require long starter motor runs. Adopt a method of priming the cylinders, in the interest of prompt starting.

Low Tension Magneto for Ignition

F. M. Writes—I have a gasoline engine, equipped with single-spark ignition from dry-cells only. Would it be possible to install a low tension,



cells to start on and the magneto to run on? I cannot use a high-tension magneto, as there is no way to time it. What is the cottage of a low-tension magneto and how should it be wired to the coil? Would there be any advantages in using it?
Answer: You could do so. These magnetos are of about 6 volts and one of them would take the place of your

dry-cells and prove an economical proposition. You require one that gives a direct current and has a governor on it to keep the voltage constant. We think that some of the auto-wrecking concerns have these machines on hand at low prices. You should use a three-point ignition-switch, wiring the coil to the switch lever, the dry-cells to one switch point and the magneto to the other and grounding one side of both the cells and the magneto.

Stiffened Engine Oil Interferes with Cranking



W. H. D. writes—On these cold mornings I have much trouble in starting my engine, although I fill the water system with hot water and prime the cylinders. It feels as though the pistons must freeze in the cylinders, it cranks so hard. What can I do to better the situation?

Answer—A warm garage is the only satisfactory remedy, but the use of a different engine oil, that does not stiffen so much at low temperatures, may be of some assistance. You better take this matter up with some reliable oil supply concern. Some motorists find that jacking up one rear wheel, engaging high speed and turning the engine over by the wheel is easier than doing it with the crank. Have you tried priming the cylinders with high-test gasoline or a mixture of gasoline and ether? Keeping the cylinders slightly warm, by running an electric heater, under the hood, during the night, might be found to be worth while.
