NON-PRODUCERS FACTOR IN H. C. L.

Secretary Tells Business Men
To Get Rid of Useless
Employees

WASHINGTON, D. C., Feb. 9.—In
answering questions of newspaper
men to-day regarding means for re-
ducing the high cost of living, Edwin
T. Meredith, the newly installed Sec-
retary of Agriculture, said that un-
less employees, no matter in what line
they may be engaged, must be releas-
ed from non-productive work and given
an opportunity to become produc-
ers upon the farm or in the factory.
If this is done and if jobbers and re-
tailers recognize the harm that must
ultimately come from profiteering on
the farmer and content themselves
with a reasonable profit, he said, the
question of the high cost of living will
largely solve itself to the permanent
good of all.

"The farmers of America," the new
Secretary went on, "are willing to as-
sume their part of the responsibilities
as American citizens in meeting any
problem threatening the welfare and
stability of our country, but this high
cost of living problem is a mutual one,
and they ask that it be approached by
all the people as a common problem.

They ask that there be an adequate
number of producers of wealth, and
only such number of distributors as
is necessary to perform the services
required. They ask that the banks,
railroads, wholesale houses, retail es-
tablishments, factories, all of which
are vitally necessary to the farmer
and recognized by him as such, be
speeded up.

"The farmer asks that the laborers
in the mines, the factories and the
mills, make an effort comparable to
his to see there is just as little labor
expense as possible in each article
turned out by their hands. Given this
and the manufacturers, jobbers and
retailers taking a reasonable profit
and recognizing the harm that must
ultimately come from profiteering up-
on the farmer, the question of the high
cost of living will largely solve itself
to the permanent good of all con-
cerned.

of the common sprays used for the
control of fungous diseases of fruit

strength than the grower can make,
although not differing essentially in
