Hints for the Motorist

The "Frozen In" Car

A Car With Locked Wheels Or Brakes Starts Hard
Sometimes it happens that a car is allowed to stand on a street, deep with slush, while the temperature drops suddenly and the slush becomes firm ice. This usually occurs after winter rains, followed by cold waves or in the spring when melting conditions prevail by day and the temperature falls rapidly at sundown. The result often is that the tires freeze in solidly and the operator, when he tries to start his car, finds that it will not "budge" when the clutch is let in. Repeated attempts to start by racing the engine and applying power are to be avoided, as the wear on the clutch and the strain on the transmission are then exceedingly severe. The tires should be freed before moving the car by its own power. Sometimes this can be done by persistently rocking the car forward and back and sideways, but in extreme cases the ice that has formed around the tires must be carefully removed by means of a bar or a hammer. When a car has been splashing through slush and then is left in a cold place, it may be found that the brakelings or bands are frozen in place and cannot be released or applied. Tapping the stuck joints with a hammer will usually release them, but attempts to drive until they are freed should not be made.

Wood vs. Denatured Alcohol



M. T. asks—Which is more economical to use in the radiator to prevent freezing, denatured or wood alcohol? Answer—With wood alcohol selling, at present, at about twice the price of denatured alcohol, the latter is much the more economical to use. Using the same proportion of wood and denatured alcohol in the mixture, the former gives slightly greater protection against freezing, but not nearly enough to make up for the great difference in price in favor of denatured alcohol.

Battery Auxiliary for Magneto



J. A. C. writes—My 1916 car is equipped with a starter that will not crank the engine fast enough to make it start on the — magneto that is used. Can I apply batteries for starting, using the distributor on the magneto?

Answer: An auxiliary battery can be used in connection with this magneto, but you better consult the service station in regard to details, as we do not know which model you have. However, we do not think that you need the battery, as this magneto, when in correct adjustment, should

give a good spark at an extremely low speed. We assume that it worked properly when you first received this car and, if so, it can be made to do so now, without dry-cells. This magneto is of the inductor type and requires a very close adjustment between the inductor and the pole-pieces and probably this adjustment has become faulty through wear. At the service station they can probably retune it so that you will have no further trouble. It will be inadvisable to install dry cells, if there is any other remedy, as they are rather a nuisance.



W. V. Asks—Is there any use that can be made of the spent oil that is drawn off from engine crankcases? I understand that it is of no further use as a lubricant, but it has occurred to me that it might be used for other purposes, such as making soap, or that it might be refined and used over again. Do you know if there is any market for it?

Answer—Certainly, the throwing away of all this used oil appears like a gigantic economic waste. Lubricating oil reclamation treatments, consisting of filtration, distillation and other processes are known, but we have not heard that the collection and treatment of such oil has become a commercial proposition, within the reach of the private user. Only animal and vegetable oils are of value in soap making and the only two uses of this material which we know have been made are burning it in heating apparatus and employing it as a dust layer. It is earnestly to be hoped that some general oil reclamation system may be organized.
