BOYS AND GIRLS SHOWING FINE SKILL IN USE OF THE RIFLE
Ten Lads Send in Set of Eight Perfect Hargets Each in Competition with
Small-bore Rifle in all Four Positions

When ten boys from various parts
of the country can send in eight per-
fect targets shot with a .22 caliber
rifle on an inch an eighth bull at 50
feet, two targets each standing, prone,
kneeling and sitting, it is a pretty
good indication that the young people
of the country are not falling behind
in the use of the firearm. Such is the
record made by ten contestants in the
competition for the 1919 National
Championship of the Winchester Junior
Rifle Corps, an organization that
exists for the training of the boy and
girl under eighteen in the safe and
scientific use of the small bore arm.

From the mass of targets submitted
in the competition the judges finally
sifted down the contestants to ten
whose groups of eight targets were
all possible, 200 points each. These
ten lads, whose training had enabled
them to shoot these remarkable tar-
gets that an expert grown shooter
might envy, were Richard Beck of
Bridgeport, Ohio, who finally captured
the championship in the shoot off
by sending in another set of eight per-
fect targets, William Lempka of Flor-
ida, New York, who was finally placed
second, Walter Millis of Swiss-
vale, Pa., who was given third prize,
E. J. Knischield of Charles City, Iowa,
Floyd Town of Pleasant Hill, Mo.,
Floyd L. Domina of Kimball, Neb.,
Elmer M. Folt of Westbrook, Minn.,
Ouis Madison of La Plata, Mo., Ray-
mond Schmuert of Histisford,
Wisconsin and Frank B. Beck, of
Bridgeport, Ohio, brother of the na-
tional championship winner.

As a result of the ten fold tie these
contestants were ordered to shoot off
for the final decision and seven of
them sent in their second set of tar-
gets. While every one made splendid
scores on the shoot off the three who
were awarded the first three prizes
again had remarkable targets. After
careful consideration the judges made
the decisions giving Beck the title of
champion.

Beck is a lad of but 13 yet it is re-
corded of him that he can defeat every
member of the Bridgeport Rifle Club
except his own father. Beck's eight
targets on the shoot off were all in-
side the three-quarter inch black ring
and either inside or cutting the line
of the three eighths inch bull giving
him a perfect score again of 200.
When it is considered that these eight
targets were fired in the four differ-

ent target shooting positions at fifty
feet and that young Beck was under
the handicap of a sore hand and a se-
vere toothache at the time he shot
them it is no wonder experts have de-
clared them extraordinary indeed.

Beck's shooting was witnessed by
the entire membership of the Bridge-
port Ohio Rifle club and his work cre-
ated little short of a sensation among
the shooters.

That so many splendid targets
should have been received from these
young shooters shows the spirit and
training that many young people are
receiving today in rifle shooting and
that the material for expert riflemen
among the coming generation is not
being neglected.

From another Bridgeport, a great
industrial city of Connecticut, comes
the Girl National Champion of the
Winchester Junior Rifle Corps for 1918
who at the age of 14 is showing that
the boys of the coming generation are
to have no monopoly on shooting hon-
ors. Marjorie Kinder is already widely
known among shooters through her
remarkable work with the rifle. She
won the Ladies' Small-bore Sweep-
stakes at Caldwell on the 50 yard
range with a perfect score last Aug-
ust. She has started off the new year
in impressive fashion by a phenomenal
indoor shooting exhibition in which
she fired 100 shots off hand in two
stands of fifty each and compiled a
score of 2,494 out of a possible 2,500.
This shooting was done on a fifty foot
range. Of the first fifty shots Miss
Kinder made six perfect targets and
did the shooting in 30 minutes. Of the
second half century she made nine per-
fect targets out of ten and did the
entire shooting in 22 minutes.

Every shot of the 100 was in the
half inch bull except five. Four of
these were in the 24 circle and the
fifth was in the 23 ring of an inch
and a half radius. Friends of Miss
Kinder are inquiring as to whether
this is not a record under all the con-
ditions of such shooting. At least it
certainly indicates that the grownups
are not the only ones who can do genu-
ine shooting.
