INTEREST IN FLY CASTING

One of These Fine Days There Will be a Club of Fisherman in Every Town
(By Peter P. Carney)

Interest in tournament bait and fly casting is greatly increasing as was evidenced by the large numbers that attend the eleventh annual tournament of the National Association of Scientific Angling Clubs and the numerous requests that were received afterwards by this association for literature on the regulations governing such events.

Recently the Chicago Fly Casting Club held its championship events and a gallery of some 500 witnesses witnessed the competitions. Fly casting has been more or less of a mystery to a lot of people, but when the country gets dotted with casting clubs as it now with rifle and gun clubs there will be nothing mysterious about the angling game.

There should be a casting club in every city. There are a number of them today, but the clubs are few compared to the many who fish. At most of the seaside resorts one will find fishing clubs with fine quarters but in the cities fishing clubs are few and far between. The Asbury Park (N. J.) fishing club is now erecting a club house on Deal Beach at a cost of \$40,000. The quarters will be more like a hotel than a fishing club, but there will be everything there that a fisherman wants. There will be rest rooms, plenty of lockers, private rooms for members to have their catch of fish cooked and served, etc. The club will have its own pier.

The objects of a casting club is to promote interest in scientific angling through fly casting tournaments; to encourage scientific angling and the

art of sportsmanship; to assist in the propagation of protection of game fishes and induce legislation towards this end, and to promote conditions that are incident to the sport of angling and tournament casting.

The benefits to be derived from such a club are many. Through it information can be secured on good fishing grounds, where to spend vacations; the exchange of experiences of fishing trips; the kind of tackle to use, etc. One can go back a dozen years and he will find that gun clubs about that time numbered very few. They are to be found in every town in the country today. A dozen years from now we touch to say there will be Casting Clubs in practically every town. Jot this down in your note book.

If you are a believer in the enforcement of the game and fish laws, suppose you assist the department once in awhile.

It is reported that the Frasier, British Columbia's noblest stream, is fished out. Salmon run this season has been a failure. One million cases of Fraser river salmon were packed ten years ago. This season's packing will be less than one-tenth of that. On the Skeena and other Northern British Columbia rivers salmon have been running in record numbers and the fishermen are reported to be earning as high as \$500 a week.

In New York the sum of one million dollars annually has been appropriated for game and fish conservation work. The state has started to buy up waste land to be set apart as game and fish preserves.

Inland Empire sportsmen are up in arms over an act of vandalism rarely paralleled in the annals of the Spokane district. On Clear Creek in the Yakima Valley a big colony of beavers had established themselves, constructed a large dam and backed up a small lake which teemed with game fish. Vandals dynamited the dam, destroyed it completely and made a clean up of the choicest fish. When the water receded many thousands of splendid game fish, mainly trout, were left to die.

"Sport develops the body," says A. A. Stagg, director of athletics at Chicago University in the American Magazine. "But it also develops in a man keenest of observations and quickness of preception. The official revised summary of casualties by states issued by the adjutant general show the following for Oregon:

Killed in action 1868, of whom 61 were officers; died from wounds, 79, including 5 officers; died of disease, 161, including 3 officers; died from accident, 15, including 3 officers; drowned, 4; committed suicide, 2; executed by order of courtmartial, 1; other known cases, 35; cause undetermined, 13; presumed dead, 5, including 1 officer; total dead, 512, including 29 officers; taken prisoners, 11, including 2 officers, all repatriated except 1 man, who died; wounded slightly 459; severely, 407; degree undetermined, 188, total wounded, 1054, including 63 officers; missing in action, none.
