DRIVE MACHINES FROM FACTORIES

Car Shortage Results in Automobiles Being Driven by Dealers

DETROIT, Mich. Feb. 12.—So serious is the empty car shortage for shipment of automobiles from the many plants in Detroit and Michigan that if it was not for the daring of the manufacturers in sending their new product over the snow-covered roads under their own power production would be curtailed, men thrown out of work, and financial loss suffered.

Reports at the board of commerce traffic bureau show about 50 per cent of the normal supply of empties coming into the city of Detroit for all classes of freight. Naturally automobiles form a large bulk percentage of this freight and require wide-door cars.

E. N. Hodges, local chairman of the Traffic Committee of the Automobile Chamber, of Commerce estimated that 40 per cent of the vehicle production was being driven over the road, whereas, under normal conditions only 10 per cent would be so delivered at this season of the year. Therein lies one of the revenue leakages being suffered by the Railroad administration.

ONLY 10 PER CENT

Normally there would come into the city from 300 to 400 empties a day for automobile shipment alone, whereas less than 35 per cent of this rolling stock has come in on the heaviest days and on one day, as an illustration, only 10 per cent of the normal carrying capacity was received. The traffic bureau, has kept a string of telegrams burning the wires from his office to Washington and the replies are always to the effect that more cars will be sent when possible.

So long as the weather holds good Mr. Hodges says, finished cars will be sent over the road, but should traffic conditions become as serious as they often do in the winter, production will be halted because there is no storage space enough for undelivered cars at any of the plants. Industrially accessory and parts manufacturers are suffering equally, their production and turnover being largely guided by that of the auto factories.

BETTER TIMES AHEAD

While lack of sufficient transportation facilities and the inability to secure sufficient steel and materials supply are hampering production conditions are steadily shaping themselves whereby increased output will shortly be assured.

Schmitt have put forth special effort to have a fine banquet and program to which every loyal citizen should give encouragement. Tickets for the banquet are on sale at 75 cents each at all the drug stores of the city and the Blain clothing store. The committee requests that all parties who wish to attend buy their tickets not later than Monday evening and no one can be admitted after noon Wednesday, 225 tickets were sold last year and three times that number are hoped for this year.
