## S. P. TO BUILD SHOPS IS RUMOR

### Construction of Large Repair Plant at Albany Reported in Gossip

There is a persistent rumor about the city that the S. P. car shops at Brooklyn, near Portland will be moved to Albany in the near future. No officials of the company can be found who will shed any light on the matter, but the presence here last week of A. T. Mercier, division superintendent and the superintendent of motive power may have had something to do with the subject.

It is known that more shop room is needed on the S. P. lines between Portland and Ashland, but it is hardly probably that the Brooklyn shops would be disturbed to increase facilities here. They are said to be needed to take care of the work out of Portland.

What is more likely is the supposition that the local car shops and yards will be greatly enlarged. Should this be done it would mean the addition of about 150 skilled workmen and their families to Albany and would provide a greatly increased payroll all along the line.

The company has a large amount of land lying adjacent to the station and the present shops and more could be secured to make room for the enlargements. It would mean the increasing of the importance that Albany already maintains as a railroad center.

About five years ago a survey was made for such a purpose, but during the war nothing more was said about it and it is not known just what stage such a proceeding occupies at the present time. Since officials of the company will give out nothing, perhaps events of the near future will throw some light on the intentions of the railroad.
