SPENCER IS GREATEST TRAPSHOT

St. Louis Professional has Averaged Close to 97 Per Cent for 11 Years,
Never Falling Below .96

After filling the old meerschaum with your favorite brand, pull the rocker to the fireplace and give thought to the appended figures—the 11 years total of shooting at registered targets by Charles G. Spencer:

Some average, you say.
Some shooting, we'll say—the best ever done.

You wouldn't judge a shooter by his target-breaking activities over one season any more than you would pass judgment on a baseball player by his record of one year. It is what he does over a period of years that counts.

"Ty" Cobb has won undying fame as a batsman, not because he led the American League sluggers one year, but because he has compiled the best hitting record with one exception for a dozen or more years. There is

no "Ty" Cobb in the National League, not even an imitation.

The "Ty" Cobb of Shooters

Charley Spencer is the "Ty" Cobb of trapshooters. He may not blaze out as the scintillating star any one year, but over a period of years he outclasses all other trapshooters. That 11 years' average of .9676 tells its own story, a story that is difficult to break down.

Lester German and Spencer for 10 years up to the past season have had a shooting match all by themselves for high average honors, with Spencer slightly to the good, but in 1919 German did not did not shoot at enough targets to qualify for the official averages, and not only spoiled a wonderful consecutive yearly average, but left the field entirely free to Spencer.

Spencer is the kind of a fellow who likes to shoot. His record indicates this. His record of .9720 on 8325 targets in 1909 still stands, and his mark of .9750 in 1915 on 5620 targets will take a lot of shooting to beat. His run of 565 straight in 1909 is the best ever made in a registered tournament. Not once in 11 years has Spencer fallen below .96 in the averages.

In the 1919 statistics Spencer had 28 runs over 50, of which 16 were over 75 and 8 better than 100, his best being 170.

Our nomination for the honor of being the best trapshooter for the past decade is Charles G. Spencer, of St. Louis, Mo. Are you with us?
