

SALEM AUTO SHOW COMMENCED TODAY

The auto-show, which is to continue for three days, opened at the armory in Salem this afternoon. A large crowd was present at the beginning of the exhibition.

In commenting upon the automobile industry the Salem Statesman prophesies a success for the local show. In speaking of it they say: It indicates the progress of what is now the third largest industry in the world

although it is scarcely 22 years old. "Many of us remember," the article goes on to say, "the first automobile in Salem about 1901. Some of us recall the first taxies in New York in 1900. In 15 years the production has passed the 7 million mark. The demand in this country for new cars greatly exceeds the supply at present and the foreign market is not a drop in the market of what it will eventually be. Paved roads in this country will send the number of auto trucks skyward. Man power is increased ten fold. Production is quadrupled;

and the idea that the buying of automobiles and auto trucks takes money out of the country is exploded; they bring money here, by conserving man power and increasing production. Rural districts disappear, city limits expand into all out of doors in this pneumatic age."

Of Interest To Women

The first police matrons in London were appointed in 1889.

In 1890 there were but sixty women dentists in the United States.

Close to 60,000 women are employed in the banks of Great Britain.

Women have been admitted to the University of Arkansas since 1889.

Women are estimated to outnumber men to the extent of 2,000,000 in England and Wales.

The champion "All-American Junior Chemist" is Miss Clara B. McMillen, a student of Indiana University, who has been awarded the 1919 scholarship medal offered by Alpha Chi Sigma, the national honor chemistry fraternity.

Miss Margaret Gibbons, the only surviving sister of Cardinal Gibbons, resides in New Orleans and is in her ninety-second year. The greatest of her declining years has been afforded by the visit paid her regularly each winter by the Cardinal.

A peculiar feature of the women suffrage bill now under consideration by the Government in Spain is that it does not propose to give the vote direct to women. Under its provisions a woman would be given the power to vote only indirectly, by delegating her vote to another.

FRUIT DEMAND UNPRECEDENTED

Bright Future for Industry in Willamette Valley Says Scott

Never in the history of the fruit industry has the future looked so bright. The unprecedented demands upon the canners for jam and soda fountain supplies are largely responsible for this situation. The immediate cause, however, was the war demand and prohibition. The war demand for all kinds of jam put the canners on the double quick to get berry stock enough to anywhere near meet their requirements. Prohibition has done away with more ardent drinks but has not killed the social habit of our Americans. When they meet and shake hands it is invariably "Come on in, let's have something". That something means a fruit drink or beverage carrying some fruit juice or a fruit parfait or sundae carrying some variety of crushed fruit.

The Willamette valley is perhaps the most wonderfully located valley in the world when you take into account its salubrious climate, its natural resources and geographic location. Situated between two vast mountain ranges, it has a wonderfully fine navigable river its entire length. Through the valley we find the rich basins of the Calapooth, Santiam, St. Mary's Creek and many others too numerous to mention in the article, furnishing all the necessary kinds of soil for all kinds of diversified fruit industry. The red foot hills with their mineral clay, afford the finest kind of opportunity for orchardizing in apples, pears and the like; while the rich alluvial river bottoms with their well drained subsoil furnish the ideal soil necessary for the culture of strawberries, red and black raspberries, loganberries; and the bench lands offer ideal conditions for the most successful production of gooseberries, currants and kindred berries. The opportunity to take advantage of these wonderful jam and fruit juice markets is now brought forcibly before the Willamette valley farmer. It is a mistake, idea among small fruit communities, that a cannery is needed to develop its fruit industry. As a matter of fact, a good sure market is the one thing that makes the

fruit industry prosperous. It is far cheaper to move fruit to a cannery than to bring the cannery to the fruit. Therefore, I say to the grower and repeat again, that what the grower needs mostly in the Willamette valley is good sure markets and enough well organized efficient canneries to furnish these stable markets.

At the present writing the Willamette valley is pretty well taken care of with good efficient well operated canneries, but we are woefully short of the necessary acreage to supply the good canneries so that it is possible for them to operate the entire season or to function 100 per cent, as spoken of before.

In conclusion, therefore, I repeat that the fruit industry in the Willamette valley has a very bright future, and that it behooves men who have suitable acres and who love the soil to get into this most remunerative industry. With the canners offering long term minimum contracts at prices that show a sure profit, and the market prices if higher guaranteed, the grower has everything his way with a down hill pull.
