Household Talks

A Plate Of Sandwiches

Here is a collection of sandwich recipes appropriate to all occasions on which sandwiches are served, and containing just the touch of sweet or the bit of tart which pleases every taste. Some are chosen for their daintiness and are especially attractive for serving at tea, while the heartier ones are just the thing for a picnic lunch where the appetite makes a greater demand.

Always use a sharp knife in preparing sandwiches. Use bread a day old, the finer grained the better. Spread with butter soft enough to distribute evenly, but never melted butter. Use a broad bladed knife for spreading, trim crusts and wrap sandwiches in a damp cloth until ready to serve.

Nut and Raisin Sandwiches

Use half as many nuts as raisins, passing them, mixed through a food chopper, then moistening with orange juice before spreading on buttered bread. Rich peach or apricot marmalade may be mixed with the nuts in

place of raisins. Thin slices of sponge cake may also be used in place of bread.

Graham White Sandwiches

Make a filling of pimientos and English walnuts chopped together and mixed with cream cheese and French dressing. Place four slices of white and brown bread, arranged alternately with filling between the slices and press down firmly. Then cut through perpendicularly, with narrow slices showing the alternate layers of white and brown bread.

Luncheon Sandwiches

Cut very thin slices from round loaf of brown bread spreading them with a generous quantity of cottage cheese which has been well seasoned with salt and pepper and made pink by being mixed with the juice from preserved currants. Scatter over each sandwich a small amount of chives cut into small pieces before pressing two slices together.

St. Patrick's Day Sandwiches

To two tablespoons finely chopped mint add two tablespoons chopped parsley and two tablespoons finely chopped chives. Mix with a mayonnaise to which has been added half a teaspoon of paprika. Spread upon thin slices of fine grained white bread.

Marshmallow Sandwiches

Take thin round crackers and spread with cream cheese. Place a marshmallow on top and dot with a bit of butter. Place in a hot oven just long enough for the marshmallow to puff up, then serve at once. The oven must be piping hot or the marshmallows will flatten and be tough.

Ripe Olive Sandwiches

Stone half a cup of ripe olives. Add one sweet green pepper seeded and chopped fine. Chop together until very fine, then combine with cream cheese which has been mixed to a paste with French dressing. Spread at once.

Fruit Whip

1 cup canned fruit 1 egg white 1-2 cup powdered sugar.

Drain the fruit and cut in small pieces before measuring. Put into a bowl with the sugar and the unbeaten egg white. Beat until stiff

enough to hold in shape—about 20 minutes. Pile lightly in a serving dish. Chill thoroughly and serve with yellow sauce.

Yellow Sauce

1 egg yolk, 2 tablespoons sugar, 1-8 teaspoon salt, 3-4 cup hot milk, 1-4 teaspoon flouring.

Beat the egg yolk slightly and add the sugar and salt. Pour on the hot milk and cook in a double boiler till egg thickens. Cool slightly add flouring and chill.

Economy Sponge Cake

Beat 3 egg yolks till thick and lemon colored, add 1 cup of sugar gradually, 1-4 cup of cold water and 1 teaspoon of vanilla or lemon extract, continuing the beating. Fold in 1 cup of flour that has been mixed and sifted with 1 teaspoon of baking powder and 1-4 teaspoon of salt. Last of all, fold in 3 stiffly beaten egg whites. Bake 45 minutes to 1 hour in a slow oven.

This makes a most delicious dessert if it is split through the center and whipped cream spread between the layers. Sprinkle the top lightly with powdered sugar.
