

Flue is Conquered Says Doctors of Chicago Congress

CHICAGO, Feb. 24.—That America will never experience another influenza epidemic that will take a toll as heavy as in 1918-1919 was the opinion of many physicians who gathered here today for the meeting of the American congress of internal medicine.

The fight against the disease was not won alone by medical science, they said, but through co-operation of the public.

Reports on the progress made by medical science in treating influenza and data on the isolation of the influenza germ will be presented during the six-day session.

The congress is receiving the co-operation of more than 50 leading universities and medical colleges, including 30 state universities, the United States navy and the United States public health and marine hospital service.

Due to Good Roads Eugene to have 2nd Motor Route Soon

Within 60 days, there will be established out of Eugene another motor route to be known officially as motor route B. This route will cover about 60 miles and the fact that Eugene is to have another motor route is due largely to good roads conditions, as the conditions of roads north of Co-burg and in the Cal Young district justify the putting on of this special service.

Starting at Eugene, the route will be to Goshen, thence retracing to Springfield, thence north through Co-burg to the Linn county line, thence returning through the Delrich gardens to Eugene.

The route will supply mail for about 300 families and will take the place of what is known now as rural route No. 2, adding thereto enough additional territory to make the whole route cover 60 miles. When this route is established Eugene county will have the distinction of being the only city in the state with two motor routes of more than 50 miles each. Attention is called to the fact that the establishment of this second motor route is due entirely to the good roads in the territory to be covered.

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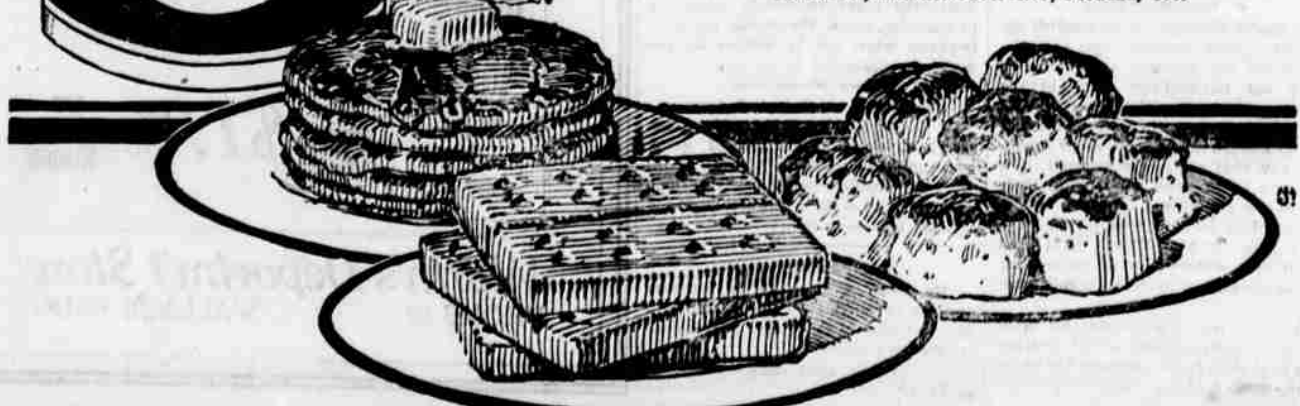
