Of Interest To Women

The Young Men's Republican Club
 of New York City has voted to admit
 women to its membership.
 The women of Egypt have cast a
 side their seclusion, and are demand-
 ing freedom from imprisonment in
 the harem.

In Great Britain more than a mil-
 lion and a half women are now doing
 what was formerly regarded as men's
 work.

The National Federation of Busi-
 ness and Professional Women's Clubs
 will hold a general convention at St.
 Paul in July.

A woman, Anne K. Greene, was

The oldest society in Spain having

 the Haines Madina Valley Railroad
 company.

Though now in her seventieth year,
 Kate Upson Clark, well-known author
 and lecturer, is still busy with her
 pen and actively interested in affairs.
 She did not publish her first book un-
 til she was nearly 50.

The first woman dog driver to take
 part in the annual Idaho dog sweep-
 stakes race from Ashton to the Yel-
 lowstone Park is Miss Gladys Van-
 Sickle, of Squirrel Meadows, Idaho,
 who drove a team of marmosets in
 the recent race.

Miss Helen Hammond, holding a
 responsible position with a bank at
 Ventura Calif., has resigned in order
 to engage in farming. She has leased
 a 25-acre tract of land in the Conch-
 ella valley, which she purposes to
 plant in cotton.

Black pearls were first made fash-
 ionable by the Empress Eugenie,
 who in the days of her glory posses-
 sed a famous necklace of them, which
 brought many thousands of dollars
 when sold at auction after the over-
 throw of the imperial dynasty.

The fact that Queen Mary of Eng-
 land has Hungarian blood in her veins
 is called to mind by the discussion
 of the possibility of a prince of the
 British royal family being offered the
 throne of Hungary. The Queen's pa-
 ternal grandmother was a Hungarian
