Found Ancient Texas Fort.

The fort built in Texas by the lost colony of the explorer, La Salle, was not located on the La Vaca river, as has been commonly believed, but was further west on the Garcia river. Dr. Herbert E. Bolton, history professor at the University of California, announced recently.

Doctor Bolton, while doing research work, found a map which confirmed a theory he had developed that the colony was not located on the La Vaca. He went to the spot indicated and found the remains of the old fort. It was 90 feet square with walls 2 1/2 feet thick of red adobe bricks. The ruins were almost completely buried.

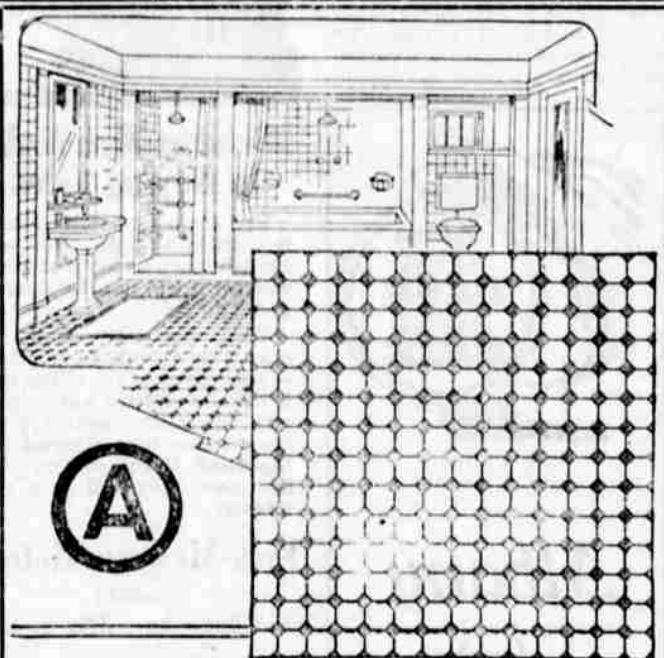
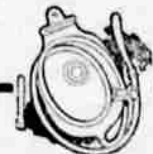
