ROSEBURG CHAMBER ENTERS CONTRACT

New Plan For Publicity Promises Great Results For City

The Chamber of Commerce of Albany might profit by the example of the Roseburg Chamber of Commerce suggests one of our citizen who stands for a greater Albany and Linn county. As a means of promoting the organization in Roseburg the directors have entered into a contract with the American City Bureau which is outlined in the Evening News:

The contract was accepted by the directors and signed Tuesday, Friday night N. B. Courtney, representing the American City Bureau of New York, appeared before the members of the chamber of commerce and outlined the company's plans for putting on an extensive educational campaign here to enliven interest in the Roseburg chamber of commerce and at that time it was decided that the proposition was a good one and should be started here. It will be almost 60 days before the drive starts and three publicity experts from the bureau will arrive here in about three weeks to make an extensive survey and gather data on this community. Shortly after that they will launch the campaign, which will continue for about two months during which time they guarantee 300 new members to the commercial organization here will mean that Roseburg will get about \$45,000.

The American City Bureau operates in over 250 cities including New York and have never yet made a failure in promoting chambers of commerce. After the drive is completed all of the members will be asked to cast their votes for 24 men of Roseburg to serve as directors. The names of the 24 men selected will be forwarded to the office of the bureau and the experts there will select twelve. From those 12 the board of directors will then appoint the secretary and complete a new organization. The bureau consists of men who have specialized in chamber of commerce activity. The three weeks educational campaign will be conducted to raise funds to advertise Roseburg. Following this they will make a careful investigation and decide upon what is most needed here and may out the projects to be followed by the local chamber of commerce.

Mr. Harding, president of the Chamber of Commerce said, "I am very glad that the chamber has decided to accept the plans of the American City Bureau. I believe it is the best thing they have done in Roseburg for many years and it is no doubt the starting point to success in their activities. Heretofore money has been expended without we have nothing to lose and all to the desired results but with this plan gain."

With the assistance of the expert bureau of publicity the Roseburg chamber of commerce should make rapid strides and with the coming of the tourist season, which promises to be the largest in the history Roseburg will undoubtedly reap benefits undreamed of.
