CAPITALIZATION OF TIRE CONCERN GOES UP TO 10 MILLION

An increase in the capitalization of the Dayton Rubber company, makers of the Dayton Airless tire, to 10 million dollars is announced here by Louis K. Geil of the Pacific Garage of Albany, agent for the product in Jackson, Benton, Lincoln and Linn counties.

"This means an immense impetus to the business and the erection of several new units to the present factory at Dayton, Ohio," said Geil today. He stated further that:

"Two Chicago men will be added to the Directorate of the organization as financial interests of that city are taking part in the increased activities. R. L. Delisser, an expert of long experience will be the new head of the sales department, which will necessarily be greatly increased and expanded."

"Last Year sales were approximately \$3,000,000," he said, "and with the new organization sales for the current year will reach approximately \$7,000,000. Construction of the new buildings will begin within the next 30 days, according to John A. McMillan, President of the Company. The new buildings will be modern fire-proof buildings. Detailed plans for the enlargement of the entire plant have been prepared."

LEBANON FARMER BACK HIS FARM

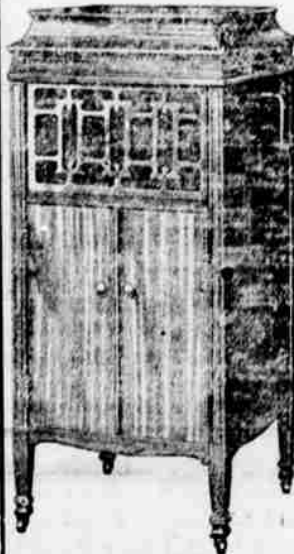
