The University of Kansas has employed women as instructors since 1867, the second year of its existence.

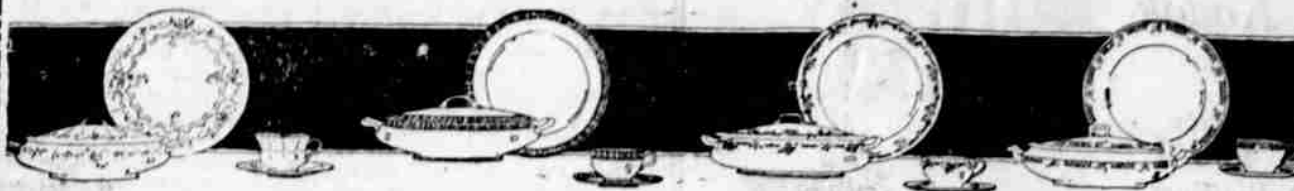
For twenty-five years Mrs. William Braddock has been owner and active manager of a big cattle ranch at Chadron, Neb.
