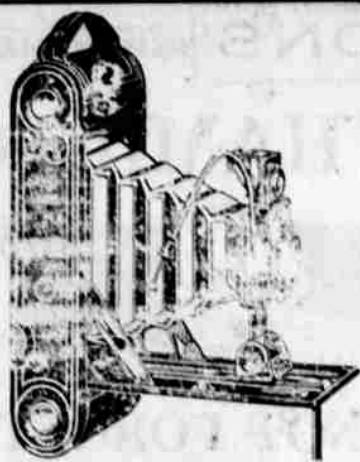

GRADUATES MAY WIN FELLOWSHIP

O. A. C. CORVALLIS, Mar. 9—Graduates of the college may become candidates for \$1000 fellowships to be awarded for 1920-1921 by the American-Scandinavian Foundation, New York, for study in Sweden, Denmark, and Norway.

"We are anxious to secure again the cooperation of the colleges in finding young men and women qualified for a year of independent research and study abroad," reads a letter from the foundation to President W. P. Kerr, "and we suggest that you nominate not more than four of your recent graduates. It is desirable that candidates for the fellowships be college graduates fitted, as are the Rhodes scholars, for finding places in the student community to which they are to be sent, and, under present conditions, it is also recommended that the fellows appointed have funds in addition to the \$1000 awarded by the foundation."

COUNTIES NEED MANY TEACHERS

SALEM, Ore., March 9.—Telegrams were received at the offices of the state school superintendent here to-

day asking that teachers be obtained for the schools of Wallowa and Curry counties. It was stated in the telegram that ten instructors are needed immediately in Curry county, while in Wallowa county there are four vacancies in the rural districts. The latter schools, according to information received by Mr. Churchill, have been closed during the entire term because of inability of the directors to obtain the services of teachers.

REPUBLICANS ARE SLOW IN SOLDIER AID IS CHARGED

WASHINGTON.—"If the Democratic administration had taken as much time and had been as slow in preparing for and prosecuting a successful war as the Republican party has been slow in giving justice to the soldiers, sailors and marines who won that great victory, the German Kaiser would today be the military master of the world," declared Representative Cantrill, Democrat, in a recent brief speech on the floor of the House, apropos discussion of the failure of the present Republican congress to enact any soldier legislation.
