TRAP AND FIELD

2217 GUN CLUBS IN THE UNITED STATES AND CANADA
Pennsylvania has More Gun Clubs Than any Other State. Philadelphia Leads Cities.

Trapshooting received quite a set back while the war was on for no less than 2,000 trapshooting clubs passed in their checks. Trap shoot-ing, however, is a sport that can come back. Those who shot at the traps prior to the war resumed clay target shooting just as soon as they got back in "civvies" and a lot of fellows who never shot at targets before did so when the opportunity presented itself after the Germans hung up the white flag.

During 1919, 375 trapshooting clubs were formed or revived and today there are 2,217 trapshooting clubs in the United States and Canada. At this time last year there were 1,703 in the United States, 70 in Canada, 7 in Alaska, one in the Canal Zone and 25 in Hawaii, Philippines, and China. Alaska now has ten clubs and there are 103 in Canada. We have no figures on the Zone nor the Islands in the Pacific.

Pennsylvania has more gun clubs than any other state—320. Philadel-phia has more gun clubs than any other city—24. Chicago has 19 and New York 11. Buffalo has 10; St. Louis 7; Newark, N. J., 8 and Balti-more, Boston, Washington and De-troit each have three. The appended list shows the number of trapshoot-ing clubs in each state:
