FLYING CLUB IS BEGUN IN CHINA

SHANGHAI, Mar. 10.—By A. P.—The Aero club of Shanghai has just been organized here and is taking active steps to promote a Chinese national organization to promote flying. Chinese, American, British, Italian, French and other nationalities are represented in the new club.

The new club intends to purchase at least one plane and plans are being considered also to acquire the use of a leading place for fliers. One of its members is Major William R. McBain who served three years in France with the British flying corps and brought down 13 German planes.

The Peking government has purchased and has received from Britain a number of planes with which an air mail service is to be established this summer between Chinese cities.

On the occasion of the visit of Commodore L. D. Beaumont, Major Charles J. Glidden and Benjamin Hillman of the Beaumont Commission arranging the round-the-world contest the project to enter a Shanghai air plane in this contest was broached and may be carried out by the new club.

BRITISH TO HAVE WORTHY TEAM AT OLMPYC GAMES

LONDON, Mar. 10.—By A. P.—Britain will be able to send a team to the Olympic games in Antwerp in August of which this country may be proud, it is declared by the British Olympic Association in a public appeal for the equivalent of approximately \$150,000 to finance the undertaking.

"The time for preparation is short, as it is for all the countries engaged," says the statement. "But thanks to the magnificent training through which our young manhood has passed in the years of war we have, in spite of our appalling losses, rich material upon which to draw if properly developed."

"We have little to guide us as to the measure of our success in competition with other countries, but we have no doubt of being able to send a representation of which the country may be justly proud, provided the means of doing so are placed at our disposal."

"All that is needed is that we should be able to give encouragement to every promising athlete, without withdrawing him from his ordinary occupation, or doing anything which could impair the full integrity of his status as an amateur."

The King is taking an interest in the preparations for the games and has expressed the hope that every effort will be made to ensure that the United Kingdom is represented by its best athletes. Incidentally, he has subscribed one hundred pounds (\$500) to the Association funds.

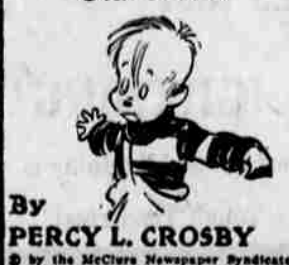

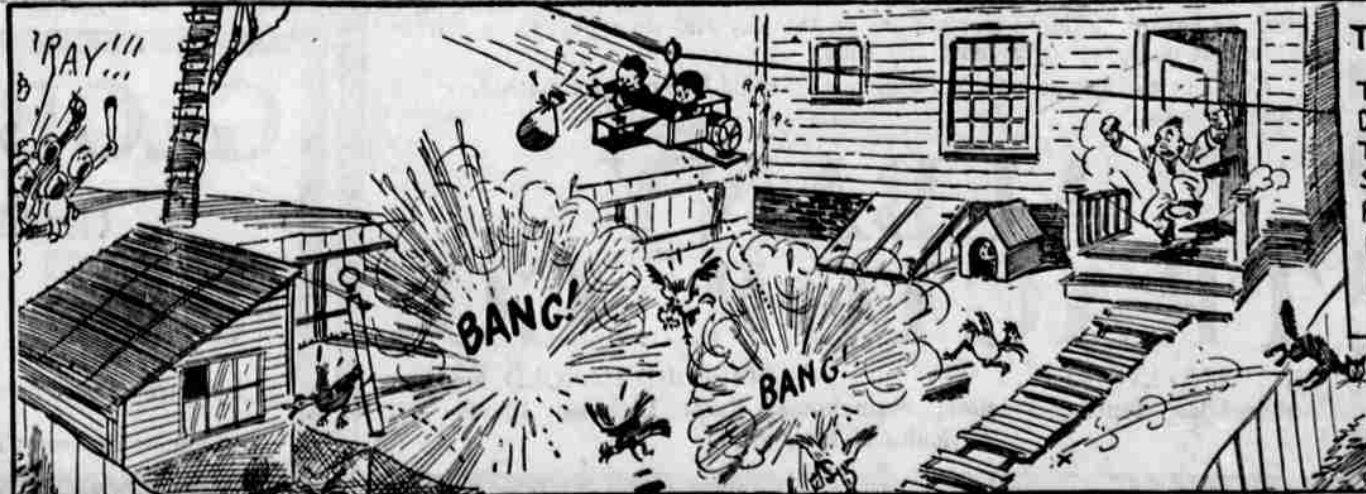
