CHALLENGE SENT TO OREGON MAN

Committee of Washington Wheat Growers Ask For Debate

SPOKANE, Wash.—The organization committee of the Washington Wheat Growers' Association has challenged G. R. Hyslop, Agronomist of the Oregon Agricultural College to a public debate on the accuracy of statements, deductions and recommendations recently made by Hyslop to Oregon farmers. Hyslop advised the Oregon wheat growers not to organize under the plan proposed by the Washington wheat growers.

Simultaneously the Washington Wheat Growers' Association announces that in the first sixteen days of its campaign for membership hundreds of Washington wheat farmers have signed the much discussed contract pooling over three and a quarter million bushels of wheat for the next six years.

Joseph Passonneau, Director of the State Office of Farm Markets of the Washington State College, Pullman, has come out as favoring the plan and form of contract. Passonneau in a statement made public this week says: "It is my belief that the plan of organization is economically sound." Speaking of the contract, Passonneau says, "Like most of the contracts being used by successful cooperative societies, it is binding upon the grower over a considerable number of years. This is considered by most authorities on co-operation to be necessary to insure success. In Denmark, the cessful co-) 1920 am -SETAN UN country which leads the world in successful co-operation among farmers, association contracts generally cover a period of about fourteen years."

Edward C. Johnson, Dean of the Washington State College, at a recent public meeting of the Whitman County wheat growers said, "Without this contract' neither volume of business, stability or permanency would be assured."
