ADVERTISING GETS WORKING CAPITAL DECLARES EXPERT

ATLANTA, Ga.—"Advertising is as difficult to define as love," Carlisle N. Greig, advertising expert, told the Retail Merchants' association.

"Advertising is a sort of super-salesman," said Mr. Greig, "a megaphone voice which appeals to a great number of people at the same time. Advertising will bring 'em in, money in hand, to take away the merchandise you wish to turn into cash—today for this reason, tomorrow for that. It is much more than a salesman—it is the special partner that provides working capital, that finds the funds to pay the bills before they come due."

"When advertising fails, it is because it is underworked or over-worked."

In the near future to discuss the millage bill that will come before the voters at the coming election, Anderson is chairman of the local O. A. C. Alumni association.

There is much interest in the millage bill's fate at the hands of the people, for upon its success or failure stands the future of the state university, the agricultural college and the state normal school at Monmouth. All are in dire need of funds and the passage of the bill is imperative for the further continuance of the three institutions upon a proper basis.

LOWER PRICES ARE PREDICTED

Lower prices for commodities are probable as a result of contraction of domestic consumption and decline in exports due to unfavorable European rates, it is declared by the National Bank of Commerce in New York in the March issue of its magazine, Commerce Monthly. The bank expresses the opinion, however, that these influences will not bring on a radical price drop but that there will be a gradual readjustment.

"From June, 1919, until January, 1920," Commerce Monthly says, "commercial and financial activities were stimulated by two main factors: the strength of the domestic demand for goods for immediate consumption, and the demand from abroad. Domestic purchasing power has represented to an undesirable extent the expenditure of funds which should have been set aside as capital, and production has not expanded as rapidly as consumption. Europe has given evidence of unlimited demand on credit, but it has neither restricted its purchases to commodities for use in productive activity, nor shown evidence of vigorous efforts to expand production in order to liquidate its indebtedness. To correct this situation, conservation of credit both for domestic and foreign transactions became an absolute necessity some weeks ago, and the effects of the steps taken to secure it will doubtless become evident in the near future."

"The wholesale trade in many lines reports retailers as buying with caution, and manufacturers in those lines which produce goods of those classes which enter immediately into a consumption are meeting with a similar uncertainty. In other words, it now seems probable that there is a definite limit to the demand of the public at present prices. Conditions in the export trade are even more difficult. The discount on European exchanges in this market has now reached a point where a curtailment of our export trade is taking place. Buying orders are being cancelled, and ships are leaving our shores in ballast. The contraction of domestic consumption, and the decline in exports will probably be reflected in lowered prices. Moderate price recessions and price stabilization are a desirable and, indeed, an inevitable result of the steps which have been taken gradually to bring commerce and industry to that sane, productive basis which is the only foundation for permanent prosperity."
