EUGENE, MEDFORD IN SCHOOL ROWS

Many Cities in State
are Havink Trouble
With Faculties

Medford and Eugene are each in a school row over the general management of the schools. In Eugene the teachers are reported against Superintendent Rutherford alleging that many of the plans used in the schools are not progressive and a general lack of system in many respects should be adjusted.

In Medford the report comes that the superintendent and the school board have let out a number of the teachers and that a storm of protest is coming from the teachers and friends. Nine teachers in the high school are reported dropped. The superintendent, who came to Medford from Dakota has a three year contract and is under obligations to advance the standard of the schools, and it is surmised that the teachers have been dropped on account of a proper co-operation with the superintendent and the school board.

Other places in the state are having similar trouble and it is probable that more than the ordinary number of changes will be made this year.

FUNDS FOR STAND ASKED FROM CITY

Structure for Takena Park
Park Proposed Before
The Council

Plans for a proposed band stand and comfort station to be erected at Takena park will be submitted to the city council at an early session by Mrs. R. E. Mason. The subject was discussed at the meeting last night and the council indicated that if the cost was within reason the funds would be forthcoming.

Mrs. Mason explained to the board the views held by the Civic Improvement club for the erection of a suitable building on Takena park. She had the design of a concrete stand in one of the Salem parks which she declared practically what was desired here. At the next meeting she stated that she would be able to give the board the exact cost of duplicating this structure.

The board complimented Mrs. Mason for the excellent work which the club had done in the improvement of the park and all expressed themselves as favorable to granting the request for additional funds for the building.

Petition for the widening of Pine street between the Santiam road and Eighth street was referred to the committee on streets and public property at the council meeting last night.

Widening of Second street at the East end of the city limits was taken under consideration. An ordinance was passed for the construction of a lateral sewer three blocks in length running from the main trunk sewer at Fifth street and bids ordered advertised. County recorder was ordered to draw warrants for \$200 as payment for block 48 of the Hazelwood addition in another ordinance passed by the council.

The sum of \$100 was ordered paid to Mrs. R. E. Mason to be used for the expenses connected with the improving of Takena Park.
