GARDENS CUT THE COST OF LIVING

Food prices are high, but food grown in home gardens costs comparatively little more than before prices began to ascend. This additional reason for home gardening in 1920 is put forward by specialists of the United States Department of Agriculture. They quote a letter from a New York business man. He wrote:

"Food costs today are practically double those of 1914, but the cost to plant and care for a home garden has not increased to any considerable extent. The clerk, salesman or professional man who grows his own vegetables and small fruits reduces the family food bill. More important still, he increases the total food supply of the country. He enters the producing class. To a very appreciable extent the home gardener can solve the high cost of living."

How can the man who never gardened learn how to garden? One good way is to write to the United States Department of Agriculture, Washington, D. C., or to the State college of agriculture for a bulletin that describes every step in making a backyard or vacant lot help feed his family.

Home Cookery Aids For Busy Home-Makers

Breakfast Suggestions

Breakfast usually presents problems which are not concerned with any other meal, and which often result in scantiness of food or indigestible combinations, neither of which is necessary. A few general rules, easily followed, will enable the housewife to "start the day right" for every member of the family. Acid fruit, such as oranges or grapefruit, should never be served with cereal and cream and as cereal is both nourishing and satisfying for old and young, it is unusually much better to serve the milder fruits in the morning. Canned peaches, prunes or plums, stewed figs, dates or raisins combine well with cereal, and by adding tomato sauce to an omelet or cooking bacon or dried beef with eggs the heavier part of the meal has a marked flavor.

Fish for breakfast demands an acid in either fruit or an accompanying sauce. In that case a cereal muffin may take the place of the cooked cereal.

Vegetables have a very definite place in the breakfast menu and should not be neglected, especially in the spring. There are several which combine well with eggs and in omelets.

Shirred Eggs With Spinach

1 can spinach, 1 tablespoon fat, 2 tablespoons flour, 1-2 teaspoon salt, 1-8 teaspoon pepper, 1 cup milk, 4 eggs.

Chop the spinach very fine. Melt the fat, add the flour, salt, pepper and milk and stir till the boiling point is reached. Add the spinach and pour into a shallow greased baking dish. Break the eggs onto a saucer one at a time and put them on top of the creamed spinach. Bake until the eggs are firm.

Asparagus Omelet

1 can asparagus tips, 1 tablespoon fat, 2 egg yolks, 3 tablespoons hot water, 1-2 teaspoon salt, 1-8 teaspoon pepper, 3 stiffly beaten egg whites.

Drain the asparagus tips. Melt the fat in the frying pan and tip so that the sides and bottom are thoroughly seared. Beat the yolks till thick and lemon colored, add the water, seasonings and asparagus tips and fold in the egg whites. Turn the mixture into the hot pan and cook slowly over the fire till "puffed" and delicately browned underneath. Then place in oven to finish cooking. Fold turn onto hot platter and serve at once.

Of Interest To Women

STATE LAWS FOR FIRE INSURANCE

Department of Agriculture Makes Suggestion for Bill for Farmers

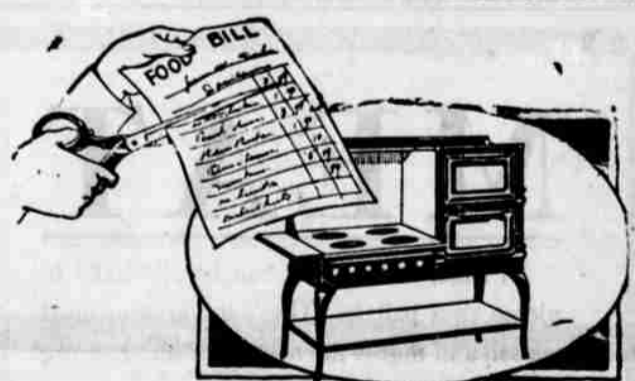
