FRUIT COMPANY ADDS EQUIPMENT

To cope with increased output of California products, the Pacific Fruit Express will spend two million dollars this year on enlarging its icing facilities. C. M. Secrist, Vice President and General Manager announced today. This is in addition to the 4,000 new refrigerator cars already announced and which will cost between fifteen and sixteen millions.

"Regardless of the high cost of machinery, building materials and labor," said Secrist, "we are making an effort to provide shippers with the increased facilities they require for preservation and transportation of their products."

D. S. C. IS GIVEN TO OREGON MAN

WASHINGTON, Mar. 12.—Captain William of Ashland, Or., an officer of the 38th infantry has been awarded a distinguished service cross by the president for extraordinary heroism in action in Champagne-Marne defensive, July 16, 1918, and the Champagne-Marne defensive October 9, 1918.

The citation says that on July 16, while the members of his patrol acted as a covering detachment, he entered an enemy dugout and captured a prisoner, thus securing valuable information. On October 9, according to the citation, he led a combat patrol into the enemy lines and succeeded, under heavy fire, in putting two machine guns out of action, thus enabling his own company and one of another regiment to advance.

New Express Train No. 14, Eugene to Portland, will leave Albany 12:47 p. m., arrive Salem 1:35 and Portland 3:45. It will make all local stops between Eugene and Tualatin except Wintel, Loganville and Fellers.
Limited Train No. 16, Eugene to Portland, will leave Eugene 1:55 instead of 1:40; Albany 3:07 instead of 3:00 arrive Portland 5:45 instead of 5:55. Stops will be made only at Junction City, Harrisburg, Gray (Corvallis), Albany, Orville, Salem, West Woodburn, Tualatin and Garden Home. Observation-parlor car and coaches will be carried.

New Train No. 20, Corvallis to Portland, will leave Albany 4:35 p. m., arrive Salem 5:25; Portland 7:40, making all local stops south of Tualatin.

Train No. 22 for Portland will continue to leave Albany 6:55 p. m., but will not stop at Pirtle, Wintel, Loewi and Hazelau.

New Local Train No. 1, Portland to Eugene, will leave Portland 6:30 a. m., Salem 7:35; Albany 9:26; arrive Eugene 10:50, making all stops south of Garden Home.
Limited Train No. 5 will leave Portland 8:30 a. m. instead of 8:15; arrive Albany 11:07 a. m. instead of 11:10; Eugene 12:25 p. m. instead of 12:35. Stops will be made only at Tualatin, West Woodburn, Salem, Orville, Albany, Gray (Corvallis), Harrisburg and Junction City. Observation-parlor car and coaches will be carried.

New Train No. 7 will leave Portland 10:45 a. m., Salem 12:55 p. m., Albany 1:53; arrive Corvallis 2:20. This train will not stop at Wintel.
