VOTE OF PEOPLE TO DECIDE RULE Great Opportunity for Bri- ing in Danish Election

COPENHAGEN, By A. P.—No election in history has ever offered so stupendous a bribe to voters as do the Schleswig plebiscites, says Copenhagen observers. These plebiscites are to decide whether a great part of Schleswig is to remain German territory or be restored to Denmark. Denmark's interest in the outcome of the election in the three zones rose to fever heat on the approach of the date for the plebiscite in the first zone, the strip nearest Denmark. This was won by the Danes by a vote of three to one.

Intense interest centers in the result of the plebiscites soon to be held in the second zone of which Flensburg is the chief city and there the fight is fiercest. Despite the fact that the city is preponderantly German, only about one-tenth of the people are Danish, but the Danes are by no means disheartened.

Owing to the depreciation of the German mark, its value now is infinitesimal as compared to the Danish krone. It is asserted that if the election goes Danish, with the resultant accession of Danish currency, property in Flensburg will be worth 16 times its present price.

No less weighty is the effect upon the citizenship of the inhabitant. A

SMOKES FOR WOMEN MOVEMENT STARTED BY MARY WINDSOR

WASHINGTON, Mar. 10—Feminists here today are hailing Miss Mary Windsor of Haverford, Pa., as the Susan B. Anthony of the "Smokes for Women" movement.

In defiance with the senate rules committee, Miss Windsor, who is a relative of the aristocratic Winsors of Massachusetts, smoked two cigarettes yesterday in the senate restaurant. She announced today that she would call on Senator Moses, chairman of the committee, to demand equal smoking rights for women in the capitol.
