tinued, "because we are only your agents. You are manufacturing this product and that product is service." He deplored a tendency to discuss "waste," "graft," and "soft snaps."

"I think it is wrong. I think it is poor advertising to be talking all the time about the waste, and about the grafters and soft snaps and all that in Washington. There may be some one standing around who believes you mean it. There might be some foreigner who is not acquainted with our ways over here and he hears you and goes out and repeats your statements to others."

Secretary Meredith explained that only about one third of the regular appropriation of \$33,000,000 is actually used in the interest of agriculture. The balance goes to the maintenance of weather service, the forest service, the administration of the food and drugs act and other sub-divisions of the department.

"The department was pictured as serving an invested capital of more than \$80,000,000,000, the amount invested in agriculture. The agriculture and livestock product last year was \$25,000,000,000," he added, "equally in one year to our national debt at the present time one half of the wealth of France."

In concluding Mr. Meredith said he desired that all the people of America know what the department is doing, so that they avail themselves of its service to a greater extent and that the work of the department may be still further broadened and extended.
