Visits At Crabtree—

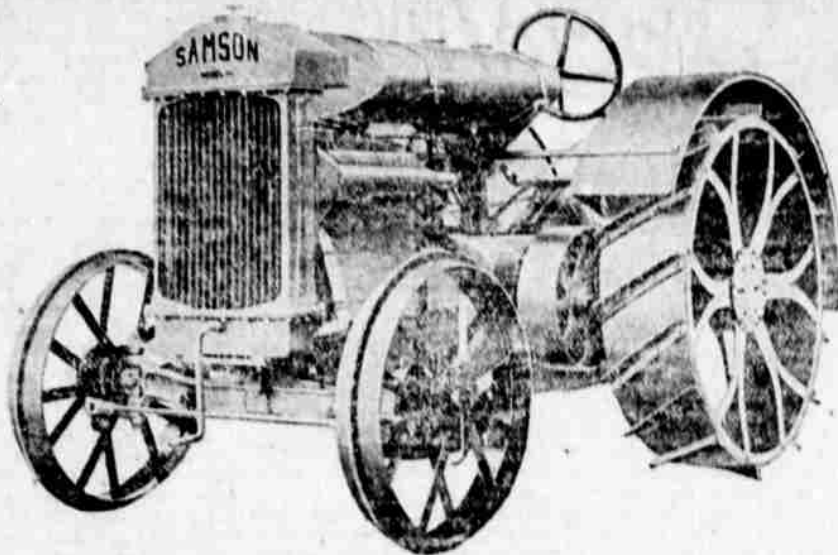
Volna Nagel a student at the O. A. C., was in this city today on her way to Crabtree to visit her sister.
