Home Cookery Aids For Busy Home-Makers

Corn Pancakes and Bacon
1 can corn, 1 cup flour, 2teaspoons baking powder, 1 teaspoon salt, 1-8 teaspoon pepper, 2 egg yolks, 2 stiffly beaten egg whites, sliced bacon.

Mix and sift the flour, baking powder, salt and pepper. Beat the egg yolks till very light and add to the corn. Combine the mixtures, stirring constantly, and fold in the egg whites. Cook on a hot greased griddle and turn to brown on both sides. Broil the bacon and arrange around the cakes on a hot platter. Serve immediately.

French Toast with Orange Marmalade
1 glass orange marmalade, 6 slices bread, 2 eggs, 3-4 cup milk, 1-4 tea spoon salt, 1-8 teaspoon pepper.

Make 3 sandwiches of the bread, spreading the orange marmalade between. Beat the eggs and add the milk and seasonings. Dip each sandwich into the mixture, soaking sufficiently to allow all the liquid to be absorbed. Bake on a hot greased griddle, turning so that they are golden brown on both sides. Serve at once.

Raisin Cereal Gems.
4 tablespoons fat, 1-2 cup sugar, 1 egg, 1-2 cup milk, 2 cups flour, 1-2 cup cornmeal 5 teaspoons baking powder 1 teaspoon salt 1 cup seedless raisins.

Cream the fat, add the sugar slowly, then the well-beaten eggs and raisins. Mix and sift the dry ingredients and add alternately with the

SETTLERS ASKED TO TAKE NOTICE

All settlers on O. and C. lands claiming preferential right by reason of settlement prior to December 1, 1913, should take note of the following provision in the regulations relating to the opening of those O. and C. Lands:

Filing Application. An application for a preference right under the proviso must be filed in the land office in which the land is situated, on or after 9 a. m., standard time, April 12, and prior to 4:30 p. m., standard time May 8, 1920, and unless so filed all rights under the proviso will be forfeited.

W. C. T. U. GIVEN DECIDED REBUFF

PORTLAND, Mar. 13—Efforts of the Woman's Christian Temperance union to spread its anti-tobacco propaganda through the medium of the high schools of Portland have met with a rebuff.

The board of directors of the Portland public schools, at a special meeting Thursday night, adopted a resolution against prize-essay contests being conducted in the schools of the city without the specific sanction of the board. This action, according to directors and Superintendent Grout of the public schools, is a direct notice to the W. C. T. U. that further activities in its anti-tobacco campaign will not be tolerated unless they are approved by a majority of the board.
