UNIQUE HEALTH MEASURE TAKEN

Pendleton school children are asked to report at the morning recess but not to answer for mischief. Not much they stop right up to teacher and get a glass of fresh milk. Fifty-three children in the Lincoln school are given a half pint each morning, and 44 in Washington. Parent and teachers cooperate with the home demonstration agent, Miss Harmon, who suggested this means of supply more of the great protective food. Teachers in the first and third grades weigh the children and record increase in weight. Many more children would be supplied but the milk is not to be had.

March 24, 1920 for the construction of an 8" lateral sewer beginning at a manhole to be constructed in the Railroad Street trunk sewer midway between Second and Third Streets and running there easterly through the center of Blocks 104, 111 and 112 of Hackleman's Addition to the City of Albany, Oregon, a distance of 878.2 feet, or so much of the present lateral sewer in place as shall be found deteriorated to the extent that it needs replacement.

Said sewer construction to be made in accordance with the charter and the ordinances of the City of Albany and the plans, specifications and estimates of Engineer John R. Penland on file in the office of the Recorder where plans may be seen and specifications and estimates obtained.

Bids will be opened at 7:30 o'clock p. m. March 24, 1920.
