O. A. C. STUDENT FUND HELPS 734 STUDENTS

That every help and encouragement necessary, is given in this age, to help and inspire the young man or woman to secure a college education is again evidenced by the following plan, as stated in a recent issue of the *Corvallis Gazette Times*:

The O. A. C. student loan fund which has helped 734 students to receive college training, is now entirely inadequate to meet the demands. Applications for loans amounting to \$1520 were received at the last meeting of the committee, while it was possible to grant only \$380. As a result one man who could be aided over for the rest of the school year by a loan of \$40 or \$50 will have to leave the institution at the end of the present term. Others are said to need the money equally as much.

The total amount in the loan fund is now \$509, every penny of which is out. The loan fund committee is hoping that friends of the institution will come to the rescue in the present situation and thereby enable deserving young men and women to complete their education.

ENGLISH FOSTER HOSTILE RIVALRY

Buenos Aires, Bq. A. P.—Some British interests here have undertaken a publicity campaign in what has been referred to as "the great struggle" between the United States and Great Britain for the markets of South America. "Special telegrams" from London purporting to show that the United States is losing her South American markets, or otherwise disparaging the United States, have been continuously distributed by a British Advertising agency and have been widely published in Argentine newspapers.

One of the telegrams was a criticism of Herbert Hoover for saying that the European countries should "work more and ask less of the United States." The "telegram" made a comparison between the losses sustained by the European allies in the war, particularly the British dominions, as compared with those of the United States and pointed out that the losses of the European countries had reduced their productive capacity whereas the United States had not suffered at all economically.
