CRIME ON WANE IN LINN COUNTY

Only Two Prisoners in the County Jail Since Beginning of the Year

Various reasons have been given for the great dearth of prisoners in the county and city jails of Albany which has been noticeable since the beginning of the present year. No other county in Oregon say the officials can point to so excellent a record in the same period.

Prohibition advocates point to the scanty police records, as a justification of their contentions and maintain that the chief reason for the scarcity of crime is attributed to the result of their theories in practice. Authorities say that the great scarcity of labor and the high existing wages on the coast is a vital factor in keeping men out of jail.

Since January 1, 1920 up until Thursday there have only been two men incarcerated in the Linn county jail. One of these escaped and the other was released following his exoneration by the grand jury. The city jail has fared little better than its competitor in Albany.

Gradual diminution of the great army of tramps who sojourned up and down the Pacific coast prior to the United States entry into the war is the reason assigned by Chief of Police Catlin for the absence of one of the city jail's most popular form of lodgers. The "Jungles" avers the chief are a thing of the past. No longer he says do the camp fires burn at night near the switching points of the trains and side door pullmans.

RUNAWAY BOY IS FROZEN TO DEATH

BAKER, Ore., Mar., 19.—Daniel Fehan, 13-year-old adopted son of Mr. and Mrs. Joseph Ryan of Unity, who ran away last Friday because of alleged mistreatment, was found frozen to death in a snowdrift in the hills 17 miles west of Unity by searchers who had followed the child's footprints in the snow.

Preparations had been made to drain the Whited reservoir, where the boy's rifle had been found Wednesday but were cancelled when the news of the finding of the body was received here. The body was brought to Baker by Dr. C. D. Houser, who later returned to Unity. Funeral services were held from the St. Francis' cathedral in Baker, today.
