FUEL INCREASE IS HELD JUST Company Defends Recent Raise in Price

SAN FRANCISCO, March 22.—By Associated Press—The Standard Oil company of California, through its president, K. R. Kingsbury, in an open letter today addressed to the state railroad commission, defended its recent advance in fuel oil prices "in the hope that an increase of twenty five cents, a barrel would stimulate production and restore the balance between supply and demand." The letter was issued as a result of an inquiry addressed to the oil company last week by the railroad commission asking why an increase was necessary. As many public utilities operate their plants with power obtained from fuel oil, the commission said it believed the public should know the reasons for the increase. The oil situation in California, which the company declares to be serious, is reviewed in detail in the company's letter, which points out "that an increase in price tends to conserve the use of fuel and to check the depletion of stocks. This is the only known remedy."

COOS CO. FARMERS PANT BERRIES

Coos county is another section of the state reported to be making great preparations to go into the berry business. The last issue of the Coos Bay Harbor says: "Large supplies of blackberry sets were distributed during the past week to ranchers tributary to Coos Bay, who are planting them with a view to reaping good returns in a couple of years. The loganberry plants were to arrive this week and there are thousands and thousands of them to be set out. Ranchers in nearly every locality about the bay are going into berry culture wholeheartedly and those who have bearing vines this year have a very promising season for them, as the cold weather in many parts of the state injured the bushes and the prices are certain to be high."
