NEGRO MELODIES FEATURE OF MEN'S GLEE CLUB PROGRAM

College songs, classical music, negro melodies and jazz, with a sprinkling of stunts, will make up the program of the University of Oregon men's glee club in Albany Friday night. The club will devote one of three parts of its program entirely to negro music, a specialty of Albert Lukken, the di-

rector. The trip will occupy ten days. Albany will be the first town visited. The club has already sung in Roseburg, having visited that town last Friday evening. The men were received there with enthusiasm. "Music everybody likes" is the motto of the club, and an effort will be made to give something in the line of music which will appeal to the people of Albany. Eighteen men make up the club, with George Hopkins as accom-

panist for the soloists.

Solos will be sung by Curtiss Peterson, baritone; Mr. Lukken and Mr. Hopkins tenors. Peterson is the possessor of a voice of much power and promise. He is going to New York next year to fit himself for professional singing.
