OPENING GAME WITH SILVERTON

Contest is Scheduled Friday April 2, Team Not Picked Yet

With the first baseball game of the season between Stayton high school and the Albany high school but a week away, Coach Brumbaugh is hoping for more favorable weather so that he can take his proteges out for some practice games that will enable him to select a nine for the initial contest. It is not believed that Stayton has a strong team but Brumbaugh seeks to avoid taking chances and will put his strongest team on the field when the game begins here in Albany Friday April 2.

With the exception of Beams and Harris who are almost certain to form the battery for Albany, the balance of the line up is problematical as yet. Attempts are being made to secure the return of Willard to the high school to play the initial bag. There are several likely candidates for the position but none of them are believed to have the batting eye of the former keystone sacker.

The second game of the season and one that will undoubtedly be a stiff one comes at Corvallis on Friday April 9. This will be the first important game of the year. A return game of the Corvallis high school will be played in Albany a week later on Friday March 16.

It is announced that the interclass contests will probably be postponed until after the season has progressed further because of the nearness of the opening game with Stayton and the lack of practice that has been afforded to the school team. All efforts will be concentrated on the main games until further notice.

DEADLY OLIVES SOURCE TRACED

May Have Come From Orchard at Oland

KLAMATH FALLS, Or., March 26.—One orchard near Oland, Cal., may have furnished all the olives alleged to have caused numerous deaths from botulitis during the recent outbreak in the middle west, says Dr. J. G. Geiger of Washington, D. C., United States health bureau expert. Dr. Geiger is here investigating the deaths of 13 hens which ate some canned beans thrown out by Mrs. Swan Johnson because of suspicious appearance.

The deadly olives were of the 1917 pack, said Dr. Geiger, and he feels sure he has traced them all to one source. He said the ranch was owned by a San Francisco man, but did not reveal his name.

The public health service is working night and day, he said, to determine the cause and remedy for botulitis, but efforts so far have met small success. Personally he is working on an entirely new theory that hogs are carriers of the disease, he has established a number of facts in support of his conclusion and expects to have proof to convince the medical world before his Pacific coast trip closes.

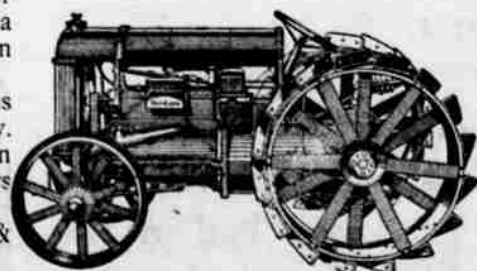
